TO UNVEIL BRONZE JUNE 16, IS PLAN

Statue of George Whitefield, First Methodist of America, 4 Years' Task for McKenzie

The bronze statue of George White-- field, who introduced Methodism into America, which was executed by Dr. R. Tait McKenzie, of the University of Pennsylvania, will be unveiled on June 16, 1919, in the triangle of the Uni-

The statue has been made possible by voluntary gifts of \$12,000 from Methodists in the University and by persons affiliated with the Methodist Church Doctor McKenzie has been at work on the statue for several years. The idea of such a Whitefield memorial was launched in 1914. The work of the sculptor has been highly praised by

Whitefield was a member of the Oxford Club, which was the beginning of Methodism. He was the inspirer and an original trustee of the Charity hool of 1740, the forerunner of the University of Pennsylvania. He solicited the first donations to the University library and was a powerful guide to the new school. Franklin said of Whitenew school. 

While Sergeant Hilton's company was advancing thru the Village of Brancourt, it was held up by intense enfilading fire from a machine gun. Discovering that the fire came from a machine-gun nest in a shell hole at the edge of the town, Sergeant Hilton, accompanied by a few other soldiers, but well in advance of them, pressed on toward this position, firing with his rifle until his ammunition was exhausted and then with his pistol, killing six of the enemy and capturing ten.
