

**ARDMORE MAN SAW  
36 DAYS IN ARGONNE**

Is One of Increasing List of  
Returning Service  
Veterans

**JERSEY MAN LIKES FLYING**

Thirty-six consecutive days of action in the Argonne Forest is the record boasted by Lieutenant F. C. Peters, of Ardmore, who arrived in New York yesterday aboard the transport Charleston.

He served with the 320th Artillery Regiment, which went over about a year ago. During the entire Argonne action his battery was in position pouring heavy shell in the German ranks and laying down barrages to protect the American advance.

Then he went to the American expeditionary force college at Beaune and taught landscape gardening. Lieutenant Peters was a landscape expert before joining the army.

**Lieutenant Krouse Back**  
Approximately 7000 students attended this university. These men came from the organizations which are awaiting places on the aviation list, and surprised those who could be spared by their organizations and who were anxious to learn some useful profession. The grounds of the university covered 200 acres, and fourteen acres were devoted to the landscape work.

On the Cunard liner Carmania, arriving yesterday, was Lieutenant Clon E. Krouse, of Haddonfield, N. J., who was formerly associated with his father in the insurance business at 325 Chestnut street, Philadelphia. The lieutenant was with the royal air forces, and enjoyed his experiences so thoroughly that he is going to enter the commercial flying field.

Lieutenant Krouse first went to France in 1915 with the American ambulance, but after remaining there for two years, during the course of which he was gassed, he returned to enlist in the American army, but was rejected on some minor physical defect. He then went with the British. He has two planes unofficially to his credit, was brought down twice and has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Croix de Guerre. He did principally night bombing and participated in raids in the vicinity of Amiens. He wears the Mons ribbon, also the Allied and active service ribbon.

Miss Frances Speedy, the pretty fiancée of Sergeant Ralph McCreery, of Indiana, Pa., left her studies at the Beechwood School for girls, in Jenkintown, long enough today to greet the young soldier when he arrived on the Carmania. McCreery, a graduate of Gettysburg, was for six months with the photographic section of the air service at Tours, where he was training to become an observer. He came back to join his father, who is in the rubber business in Indiana.
