Hear Redfield May Resign The continued mystery over the exact text of the President's message to Secretary Redfield, which the secretary has declined to make public, and the presence in Washington late last week of Julius Barnes, president of the United States Grain Corporation, is regarded as responsible for the rumors that the railroad administration might be taken up again and may be extended to food. It also was responsible yesterday for the rumor that Secretary Redfield expected to resign if the price ceiling was not pursued, but this report lacked any real confirmation. In fact, the President's recent message is taken to mean that nothing is strengthening Secretary Redfield's hand.

Center With Food Officials Chairman Peck intimated that once the cost of living was clearly reduced, it made no sense to consider food price control, and upon some such grounds, commodity prices, such as steel, might be lowered again without great injury to the industry as a whole. Peck also formed one of the most important items in the cost of living. Mr. Peck's statement yesterday was taken as an admission that the board eventually would be called upon to consider food prices. It is also known that board members have conferred with food administration officials, officials of the grain corporation and even with packers, with a view to considering food prices.
