

EXPECT WESTERN TEAMS TOMORROW

Athletes Will Arrive in Time for Short Workout on Franklin Field

ENTERED IN ALL EVENTS

Several western college relay teams will start east tonight for Philadelphia so that they will be in good time for Pennsylvania's great annual relay race carnival on Friday and Saturday at Franklin Field.

Nebraska, Missouri, Notre Dame, Chicago, Kansas State, Iowa State and others are expected here some time tomorrow. Most of these teams have men entered in Friday's events and they desire that they get a good night's rest before the championship relay events begin on decision on Friday.

Michigan won the half mile western relay championship and they will be on to try for the sprint middle relay championship on Friday and the one-mile relay championship on Saturday.

Hass Favorite
Hass, of Grinnell, who flashed into fame last Saturday by winning the sprint race at Des Moines, will also come east for that event. He has beaten such good men as Sol Butler, of Dubuque, and Hayes, of Notre Dame, and will be the favorite in this event.

As the western colleges are also entered in all the special events, the meet will go far to decide the much mooted question of the superiority of the East over the West in sprint events.

The outcome should be decisive. The duel between the East and the West in the special events looks very favorable for the Westerners, for they will have favorites in the hundred, the broad jump, in Johnson, of Michigan, the high jump in Larsen, of Brigham Young, of Provo, Utah, and very fine athletes in all the other individual contests.

Dates Fixed for Lesley Cup and State Titles

Three Prominent Golf Tournaments Will Be Revived This Year for the First Time Since We Entered the War

THE Lesley Cup matches, which will bring together the best amateur players of the east, will be played this year over the National Links of America on October 3 and 4. The Pennsylvania state amateur championship has been set for September 18, 19 and 20, and the state open championship for September 17. While the dates of the state amateur fall on the same days as the fall tournament of the Lu La Temple Country Club, it is impossible to change them, as no other dates are possible and the players who will represent the state in the Lesley Cup matches must be chosen before the dates of the Lesley Cup matches.

No Tourneys Since
None of these three tournaments have been played since 1916, when the Massachusetts players won the Lesley Cup matches, Jack Hutchinson the open championship and W. C. Fowkes, Jr., the amateur championship of the state.

In the Lesley Cup matches the Pennsylvania State Golf Association, the Massachusetts State Golf Association and the Metropolitan Golf Association are represented by teams of ten men in the foursome matches, and the same number in the individual matches. Massachusetts will be represented by

such cranks as Francis Quimet, the former open and amateur champion of this country; Jesse Guilford, one of the longest drivers in captivity; Parker Whittemore, H. W. Wilder and others equally well known. The Metropolitan team has on it such stars as Jerry Travers, four times the national amateur champion; Oswald Kirkby, a former Metropolitan and New Jersey titleholder; Fred Horroshoff, a former national finalist; John M. Ward, the old baseball star, and others who might be named.

State Team Promising
Pennsylvania will have as its stars Fowkes and E. M. Byers, two former national champions; Max Marston, Eddie Styles and others of equal note. There is no doubt that Pennsylvania will have a stronger team than in recent years, for in addition to Marston and Styles, Paul Tewsbury, one of the finest players in New England, is now a member of the North Hills Country Club, and such players as Wood Platt and George Hoffner are also likely candidates.
