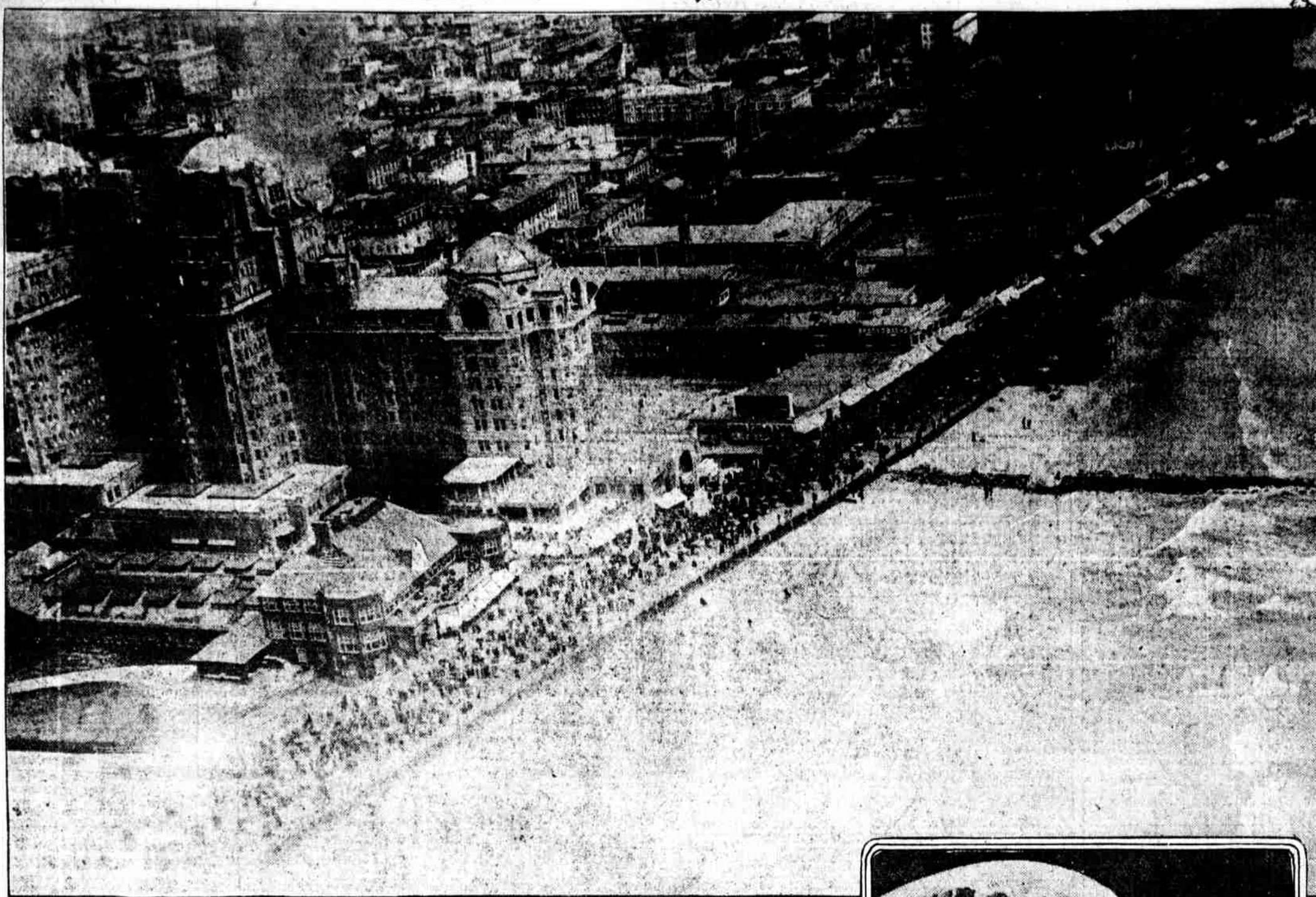
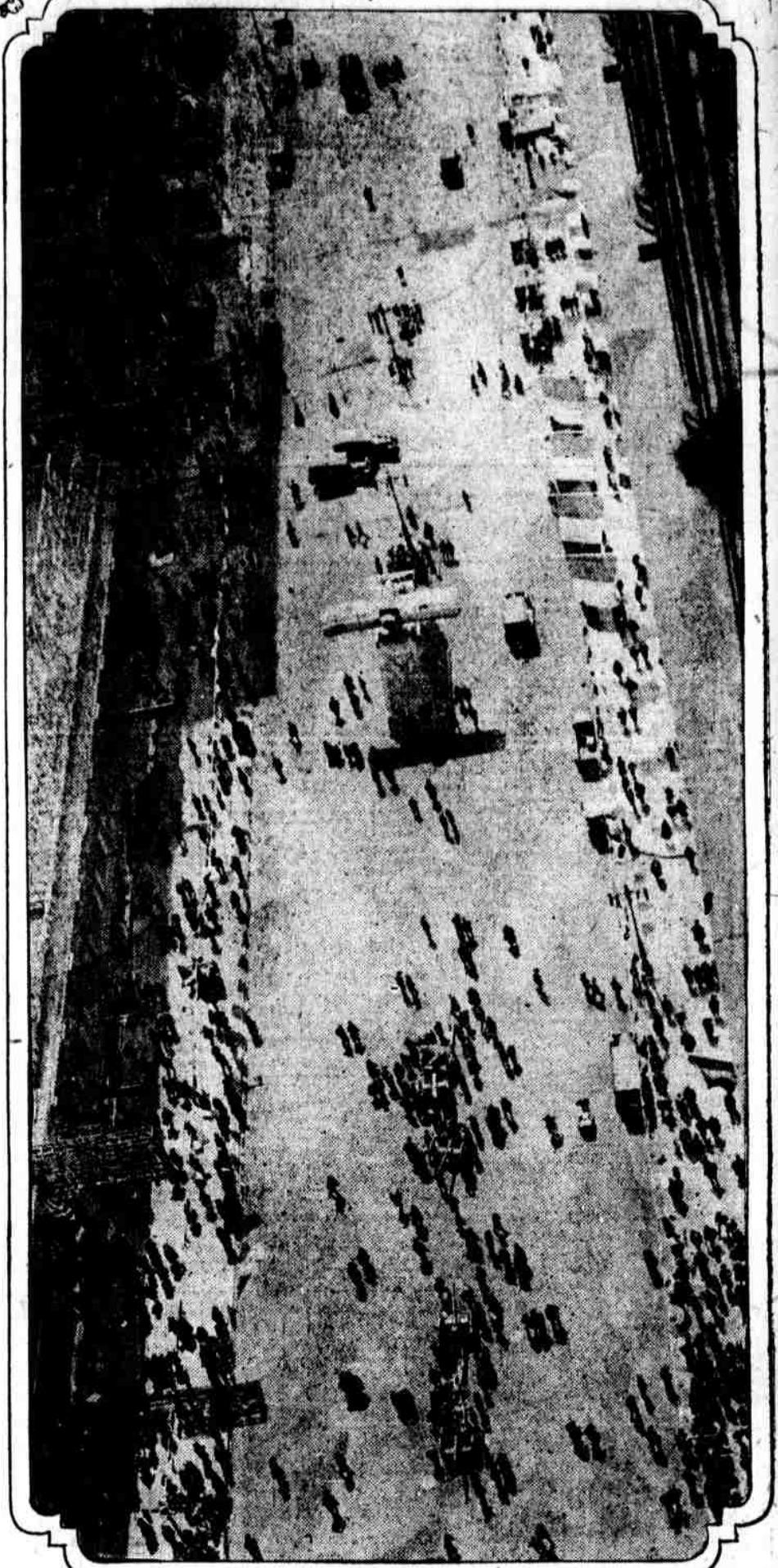


Flying Over Atlantic City's Strand : Broad Street Trophies From Aloft : Varied Scenes



AN AIRPLANE view of Atlantic City's strand, the famous wooden walk, filled with spring visitors, and the great beach hotels fronting the ocean



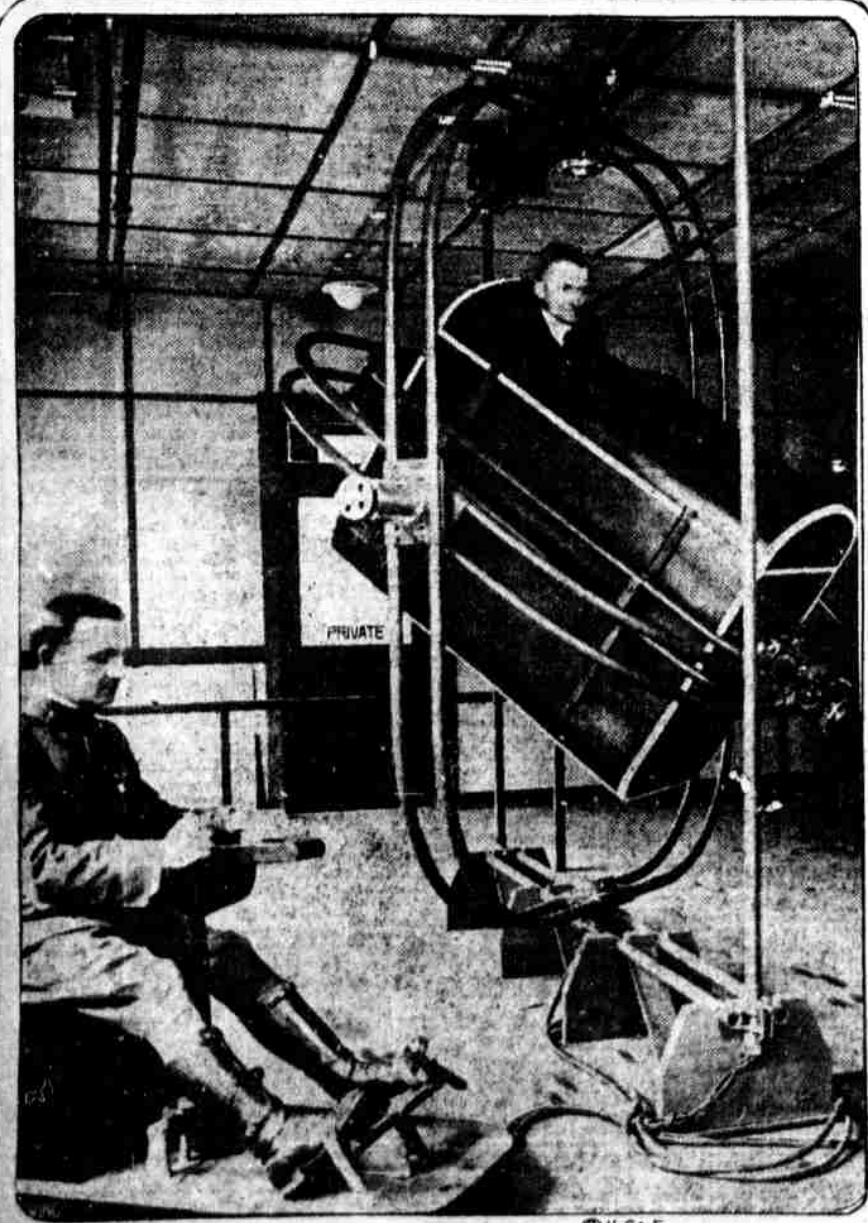
