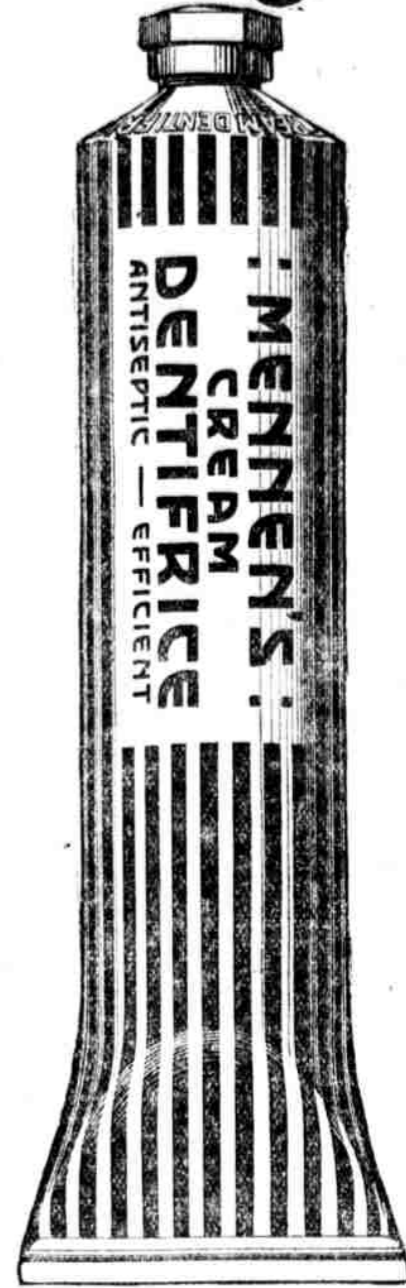

SPROUL FOR CHARTER AND HOME RULE IDEA

Governor Sproul, at his home in Chester, after recuperating for several weeks in the South, has reaffirmed his position on four points affecting Philadelphia.

The Governor says he stands for a small, single-chamber council. Removal of the police from politics. A new fiscal policy for this city.

Giving Philadelphia a greater degree of home rule. Governor Sproul also endorsed the Dalk bills, giving the district attorney an independent staff of investigators and additional assistants.

"I think they are good bills and that they should be passed," was his comment on the district attorney bills to which Senator Vare has announced opposition.

On the Brady bill, which proposes to amend the present board of reform commissioners, the Governor would not comment, neither would he discuss the police commissioner bill which aims to strip Director of Public Safety Wilson of power over the police, and vest it in a commissioner appointed by and answerable to the Governor.

Politicians interested in the situation believe the Governor's stand for more home rule for Philadelphia is an indirect disapproval of the police commissioner bill.

Deaths of a Day WILLIAM JOHNSTON William Johnston, Mill Owner and Former Councilman, Dies

William Johnston, proprietor of the Key-Stone Mill, died here yesterday afternoon at his home, 249 Spruce street, Wissahickon.

Mr. Johnston represented the Twenty-first Ward two terms in Common Council in Mayor Warner's administration. He served in the Civil War as a member of the 215th Pennsylvania Volunteers and was a member of General G. K. Warren Post, No. 15, G. A. R. He also belonged to various Masonic bodies.

Mr. Johnston was born in Newton, Standard, Pa., in 1844, and was brought to this country by his parents in 1850. He had been engaged in the wooden business since 1870. His wife died a year ago. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. John J. Foulkrod, and six sons.

Mrs. Jane S. Cunningham Mrs. Jane Smith Cunningham, aged eighty-eight, mother of Thomas W. Cunningham, clerk of Quarter Sessions Court and a Penrose lieutenant, died early yesterday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James E. Neely, 507 Belmont avenue. In addition to Mr. Cunningham and Mrs. Neely she is survived by two sons, Hugh and Andrew Cunningham; six grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

She was born in Ireland, coming to Philadelphia sixty-two years ago, and has resided here ever since. George Cunningham, her husband, died thirty-seven years ago.

This has been decided by the Fairmount Park Commissioner, who has superintended over all the public squares in the city. The decision was reached when H. Stoddling, secretary of the strike conference, applied to the commissioner for a permit to hold the meeting, which was planned to demand bonuses for all political and war prisoners in the United States.

The strike conference has decided to seek a permit for the use of Washington Square. Such a request has been made of the Park Commissioner, Police Superintendent Robinson, has been asked for permits for a street parade preceding the demonstration and for permits for a rally demonstration in four balls. No decision has been reached on any of these permits.

VILLA MASSES HIS TROOPS
