

MUIR COMING HERE FOR ITALIAN PARADE

Iron Division Commander Will Review Victory Loan Turnout Sunday

GARIBALDI MAY SPEAK

Major General Charles H. Muir, commander of the Twenty-eighth Division and the Fourth Army Corps, will appear publicly in Philadelphia for the first time on Sunday afternoon. He will review the Victory Loan parade of 15,000 Italians from the Union League balcony.

General Muir is in Washington today, but authorized his aide, Major Edward Hoopes, to state that he would come here in time to review the parade and address the Italians at a meeting in the Academy of Music.

General Peppino Garibaldi, of the Italian army, grandson of the "Italian liberator," is on the La Savoie, two days from New York, on his way to this country.

Before leaving Paris, General Garibaldi agreed to make his first public address in America before the Academy of Music meeting in Philadelphia. The Italian situation, however, has become so delicate that the local committee is not sure he is at liberty to speak.

A delegation will be sent to New York harbor to greet him, and should he decide to speak, he will be brought here immediately.

The Swedish Society of Philadelphia announced \$35,000 in subscriptions, and the Greek community of Philadelphia, \$34,500.

The parade will form at 1:30 in the afternoon at Broad and Christian streets. At 2 o'clock they will start on the march, north on Broad street to the Victory statue, where short addresses will be made. The parade will then countermarch on Broad street to the Academy of Music, where a mass-meeting will be held.

Overflow meetings have been arranged for at the corner of Broad and Locust streets, where those who are not fortunate enough to get inside the Academy, will have the opportunity of hearing the same speakers.

Speakers who have already been obtained to address the meeting include Congressman George N. Graham, E. T. Stotesbury, Judge Joseph Buffington and Colonel C. B. Franklin, of the United States ambulance corps.

One of the features of the parade will be the vanguard of several hundred soldiers, sailors and Marines of Italian nationality. Frank Roman, chairman of the Italian division of the Liberty Loan committee, last night urged the mothers, wives and relatives of these men who have signified their intention of parading to get in communication with him at 818 South Eighth street, where they may obtain tickets for stage seats.

DO NOT BUY HOUSES; GET BONDS, SAY SIGNS

Banners Appear on Pemberton Street After Landlords Bid Tenants to Move

Do Not Buy Houses in This Street, Invest Your Money in Victory Bonds!

Banners bearing this inscription that across Pemberton street, between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets. They represent a two-fold attack on real estate against rent increases and a boost for the Victory Loan.

Erection of the banners follows the receipt of notices to notify all of the house renters in the street from landlords ordering them to vacate their homes. Tenants say that one house in the block, now vacant, has been fitted with electric lights and given a new coat of paint and marked as a sample house. The sale price is \$28,000. Several years ago the houses could be bought for \$2,200 and the rent, now \$25, was then not higher than \$16, the tenants say.

But all this is mentioned merely in passing. The signs of course are meant to stimulate interest in the new bonds. The house-owners, however, say they are not going to take any chances and have formed a guard to watch the banners night and day.

11 BOY SCOUT TROOPS WIN LOAN HONORS

Coveted Captured German Cannon Changed Hands Many Times in Contest

Eleven Boy Scout troops have won honor flags in the Victory Loan drive for exceeding the quota of subscriptions given them. The lucky troops are 101, 131, 185, 206, 207, 223, 241, 255, 260, 261 and 262.

The coveted captured German cannon has changed hands many times in the battle between the ten scout districts for final possession at the close of the campaign. The lads are just as eager to "go over the top" for the cannon as were their big brothers when the gun was captured in France, and possession is a mooted question.

Several days ago Frankford (Troop 101) took the gun from Germantown (Troop 81) by attaining 46 per cent of their quota and triumphantly invaded the stricken district and carried it off. The Germantown boys, however, gathered their army together on the following night, and, despite their \$191,800 quota, went 49 per cent over the top of any scout troop in the city. With great rejoicing the gun was hauled back to Germantown.

About 2,000,000 pieces of literature advertising the drive are being distributed by the scouts throughout the city.

GERMAN SUB HERE TODAY

U-Boat Coming to Port to Aid the Loan

The German submarine U-117 is expected to dock in the north Vine street slip in the Delaware river this afternoon. It will be on view to the public until 1 o'clock tomorrow morning in aid of the Victory Loan.

The U-117, a 1200-ton minelayer, is in charge of Lieutenant Commander Distell. One of the officers is Lieutenant Vincent Astor. The U-117 is one of a fleet of five surrendered German submarines which has just arrived in this country. After leaving here the submarines will visit Baltimore.

GIRL SCULPTOR MARRIED

Jess M. Lawson, Widener Medal Winner, Weds Lieut. Peacey

Miss Jess M. Lawson, sculptor, who won the Widener gold medal at the recent exhibition of the Pennsylvania Academy was married in Trinity Church, New York yesterday, to Lieutenant Howard M. Peacey, of the Third Royal Sussex Regiment, British army. They met abroad and start for England today on board the Aquitania.

Mrs. Peacey belongs to a Canadian family of Scotch extraction. She had made a distinct place for herself in art in New York. An allegorical figure of a woman with a child, representing Belgium, exhibited by her at the Winter Academy in New York, was an easy prize-winner, and was much talked about on the opening day of the show.

There were many inquiries when the place was found to be vacant on the following day. It then appeared that Miss Lawson had, quite unwittingly, broken one of the rules of the institution. She had in fact carried off a medal with a work which had been exhibited already at a place where a charge was made for admission, or where a charge was made for the catalogue.

When she found that she was a transgressor, she immediately withdrew her group, much to the regret of the officers of the academy, who openly expressed their sense of the loss thereby incurred by the exhibition.
