Got Training at Dix and Considerably More in France **Behind Lines**

ARGONNE ACTION SAW

By a Staff Corresponden Washington, May 2 .- The "war tee ord" of the Seventy-eighth Division. composed of drafted men from New Jersey, Delnware and New York, and trained at Camp Dix, was received at the Wor Department today from the headquarters of the A. E. F. in France The record of this division, which now on its way home, follows:

The Seventy eighth Division was or gauized about August 25, 1917, at Camp Dix, N. J. The majority of the offieers were from New York state and were trained at Madison barracks. The enlisted personnel was drawn from northern New York state. New Jersey Son and Delaware. Insignia: Red semi circle with lightning flash in white. About the middle of October the di vision began the gradual transfer of over 13,000 enlisted men, more or les trained, to other camps,

On May 19, 1918, the division began movement overseas. The artillery brigrade landed in France and proceeded 3 to Brittany for training. The infantry units landed in England on June 4 and 5, and crossed to Callais by boat? three or four days later.

Infantry units began training June 7 behind the Hazebrouk front in the British area. On July 19 the divi-sion moved to an area east of St. Poland trained there until August 19, when the infantry units moved to the Bourbonne-les Bains area. On August 31 the division began

moving to the St. Mihiel front, arriving September 10. It remained in the first corps reserve until September 15 and when it relieved the Scond and Fifth Divisions. 'Th artillery brigade had meanwhile come up to this front and was supporting the Ninetieth Di-vision.


The division occupied the Liney see for until October 4, when it was re-lieved and, rejoined by the artillery brigade, moved to the Argonne For-est. The division relieved the Seventyseventh Division on October 16 and continued in the line until November , advancing twenty-one kilometers, On November 6 the division, les artillery brigade and ammunition train. moved back to the Argonne camps west of Varennes, then to Florent. Les Islettes and to the south of Ste, Menehould. It entrained for the Semar area on November 15.




