

**AGED MAN ENDS LIFE
WHEN LEFT AT HOME
BY FAMILY ON OUTING**

James Robinson, Courtland Street, Found Dead From Gas by Returning Relatives

James Robinson, seventy-three years old, 1425 Courtland street, killed himself by inhaling gas forced into a paper bag he had placed over his head.

Robinson lived with his sister, Mrs. Isaac Hoffnagel. When she and her family returned from an outing last night they were forced to break their way into the house, which was tightly locked, and found the dead body in the kitchen.

The man had carelessly tied the large paper bag around his head and then connecting a line from the gas range to a hole in the bag, had turned on the gas. The body was pronounced dead at Luke's Hospital and then removed to an undertaking establishment.

Mrs. Hoffnagel said her brother had been dependent for some time because of ill health and infirmities of his advanced age.

Dependency, brought on by ill health, say the police, caused Mrs. Catherine Stoll to commit suicide by hanging yesterday afternoon in her home, East Ontario street near Front.

Churches Name Committees to Find Jobs for Soldiers

"Jobs for Returning Soldiers" was the subject of sermons in many city churches yesterday, acting in accordance with President Wilson's request that such sermons be preached on the day he designated as "Employment Sunday."

The observance was national in character and was designed by the President to awaken the interest of churchgoers in the problem of providing jobs for the service men now being rapidly demobilized.

Special church committees were appointed to look after the welfare and secure jobs for those of their own church families who are not being able to secure employment since being discharged. After finishing the work in their own congregations the committees will work with other churches.

Business men have been enrolled in these committees, which simply put into practice the brotherhood of man. The returning soldiers and sailors are welcomed back into church and community life, and are made to feel that both church and community realize its obligation to them.

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Official Citation

CALL, DONALD M. (10275) 2nd Lieutenant, (then Corporal) Co. B, Bn. Tank Corps.

FOR conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy near Varennes, France, 26 September, 1918.

During an operation against enemy machine-gun nests west of Varennes, Lieutenant Call, then corporal, was in a tank with an officer when half of the turret was knocked off by a direct artillery hit. Choked by gas from the high explosive shell, he left the tank and took cover in a shell hole thirty yards away. Seeing that the officer did not follow, and thinking that he might be alive, Corporal Call returned to the tank under intense machine-gun and shell fire and carried the officer over a mile under machine-gun and sniper fire to safety.
