Seventy-four women golfers of this city and vicinity have entered the sixth annual competition at the Overbrook Golf Club for the Clarence H. Geist cup tomorrow.

Miss Caverly to Play In addition to Mrs. Barlow Miss Mildred Caverly, the national runner-up and the present local champion, is entered.

Mrs. G. Henry Stetson, one of the leading half dozen players of this district, is another entry. Other Huntington Valley women who have entered include Mrs. Caleb F. Fox, five times the women champion of Philadelphia and once a national runner-up, and Miss Eleanor T. Chandler, who is playing better golf this year than ever before.

Medal Play It is an 18-hole medal play competition and there will be a prize for the best gross and the best net scores and in addition the winner will have her name engraved on the cup.

Atlantic City Begins Big Spring Tournament

TWO Lu Lu Temple Country Club players opened the annual spring tournament of the Country Club of Atlantic City at 8:45 this morning. Five minutes later two other members of the same club stepped up to the tee and drove the ball toward the first green.

This will be kept up at five-minute intervals until 2:30 this afternoon. Not only is it a large entry list, but a very representative field, and the New York district has sent a number of good golfers here for the purpose of running away with the first tournament.

Fortunately Philadelphia has some of its best men down here and the New York crowd is going to have a hard time of it. Probably the favorite is Eddie Styles, who started the Pinehurst play-

ers by winning the medal in two big tournaments there and was finalist in one of them. He is playing in very fine form and he ought to go through to the final round.

Maurice Risley, who won the last two spring tournaments, is playing and Atlantic City is backing him to win. Also Cole, of the Philadelphia Country Club, Fred Knight, the hero of two marathon golf matches and who was beaten in the spring tournament here last year by Risley, but who won the fall event, and J. C. Parrish, one of the best of the metropolitan golfers, are in the hunt and we are likely to see some rattling fine golf before the tournament is over.

START TRAINING TABLE

Harvard Adopts Modified Form for Nine and Crew

Boston, May 8.—In spite of the protest among the faculty element of many colleges against the training table as a feature of college physical education, Harvard has adopted the training table for both the baseball nine and the crew candidates.

However, the training table at Cambridge is modified in many ways, so that it differs from the training tables of the past, which were deemed so extravagant and unnecessary.

At Harvard the difficulty has been solved by having a daily lunch for the baseball players and a daily dinner in the evening for the oarsmen. This scheme of so-called "partial" training tables has been approved by the athletic committee at Harvard.
