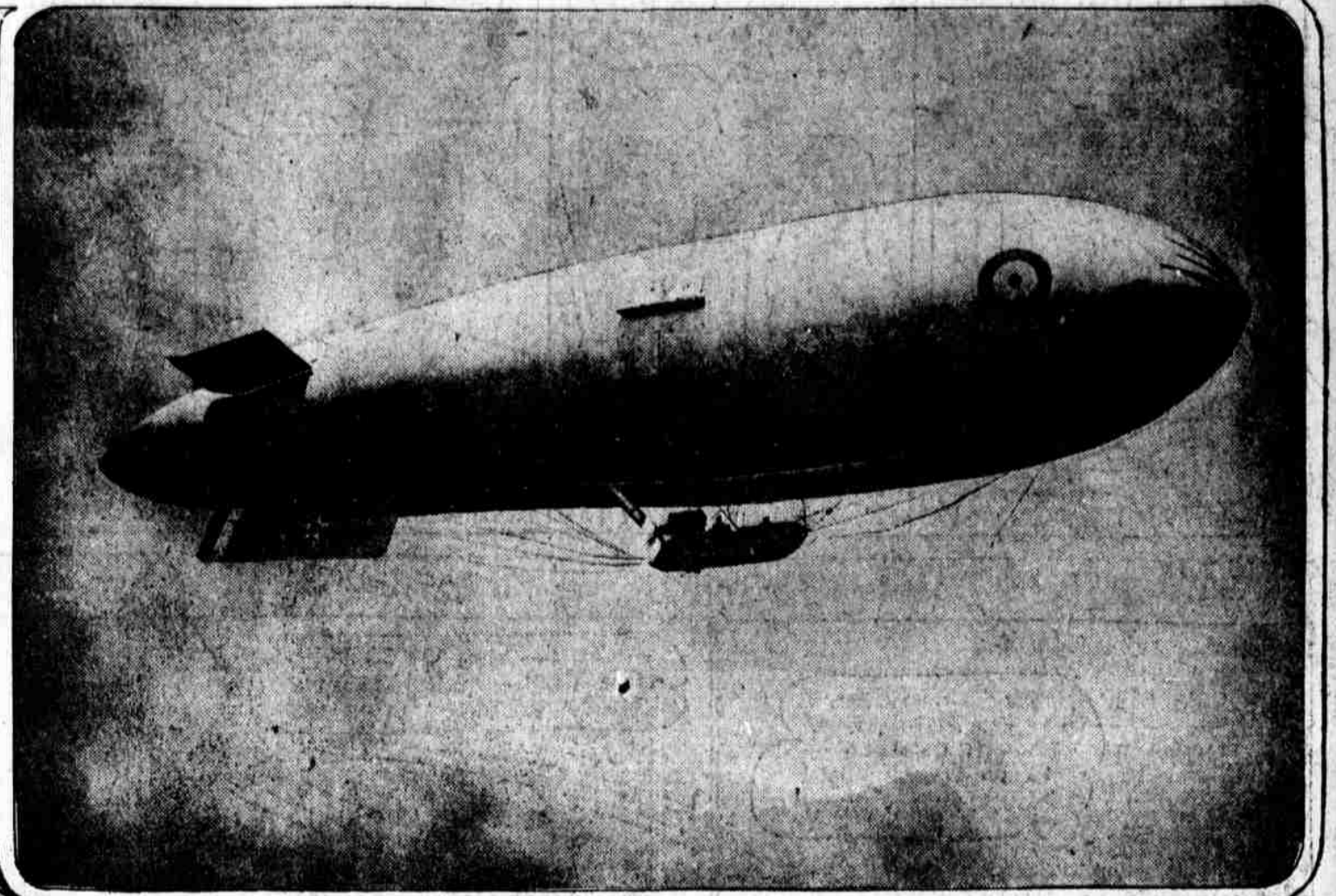
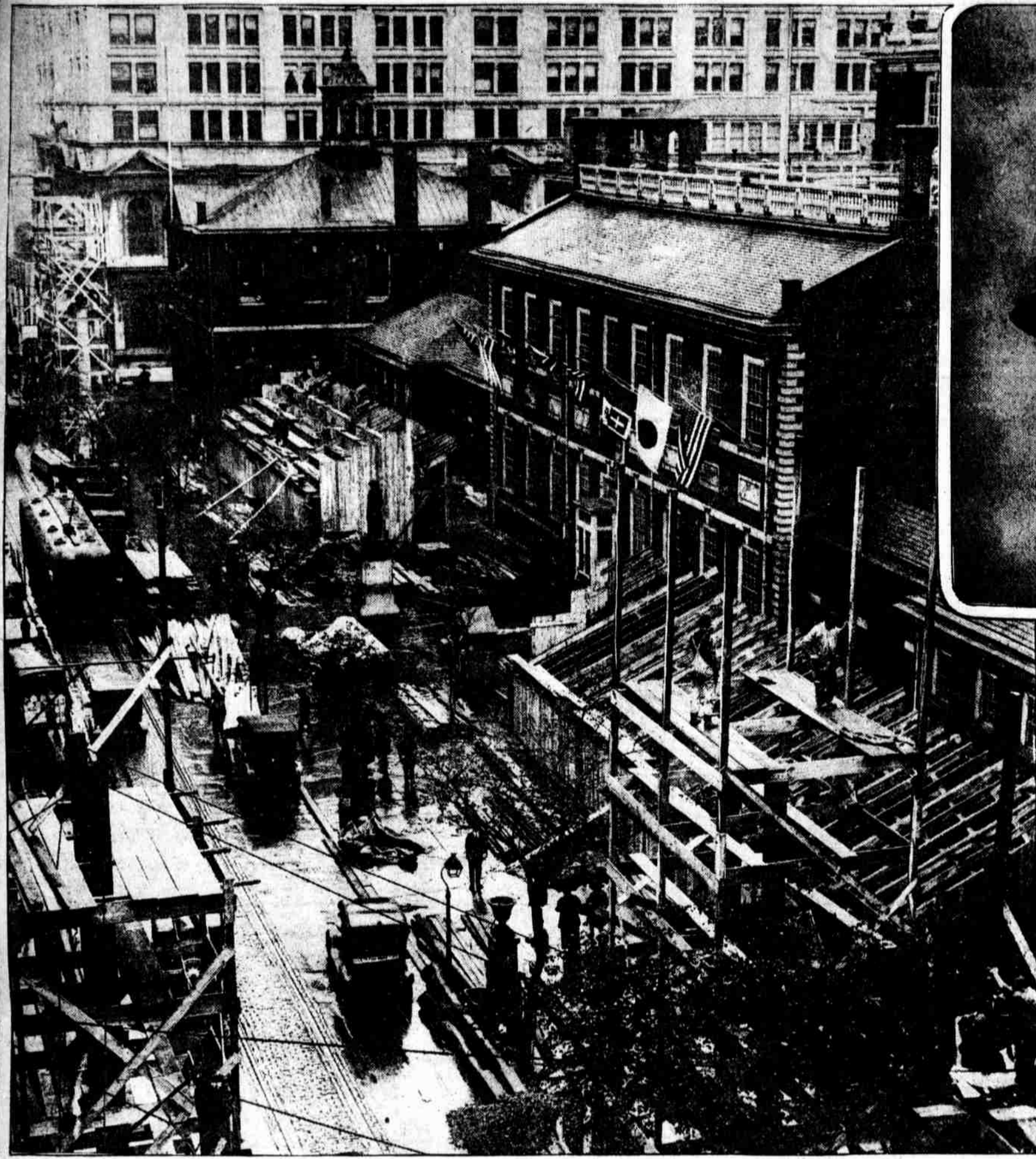
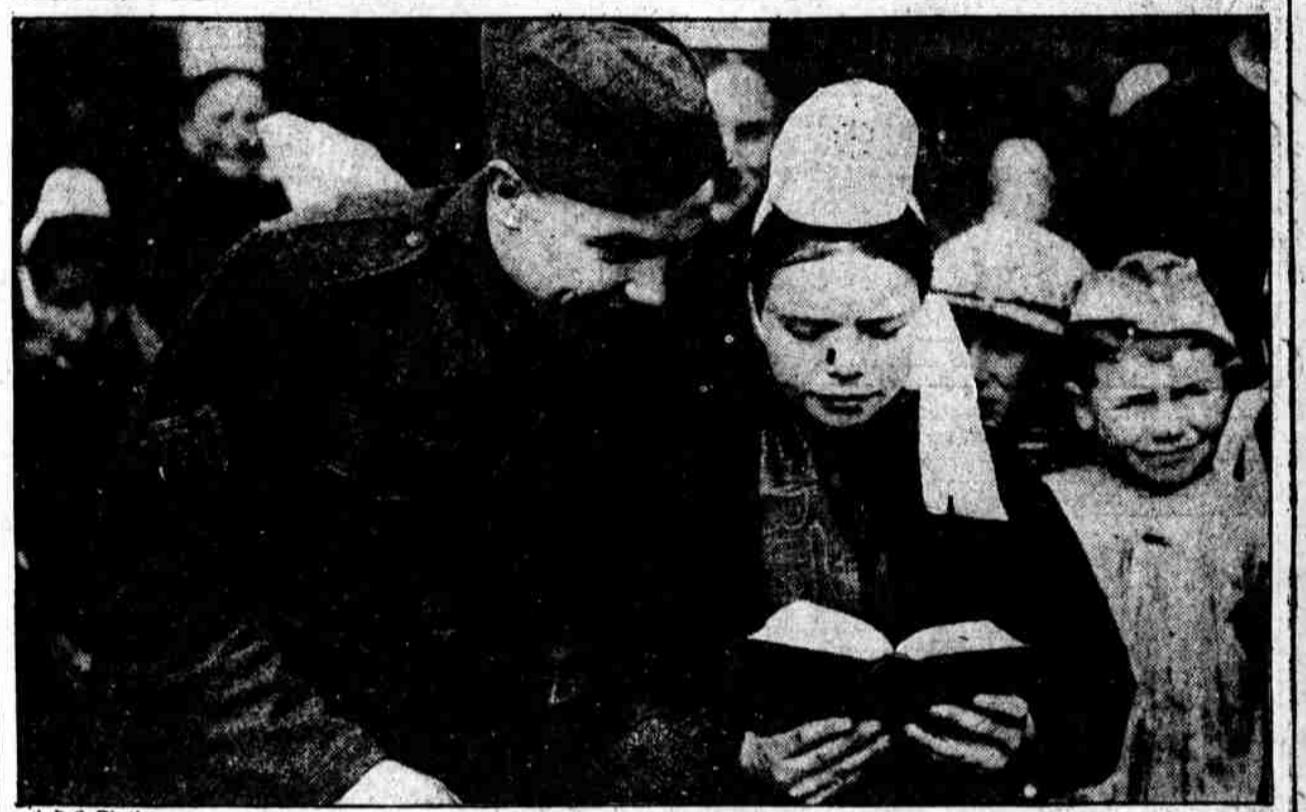


Preparing for Review of Iron Division: Art Students Rehearse Colonial Day's Pageant
