

CITY MARINES BACK WITH HONOR MEDALS

Transports Land in New York With Major Caleb Milne and Others

MANY MORE NURSES ARRIVE

A batch of Philadelphia "devil dogs" has arrived home from overseas on several transports that reached New York yesterday. Many wear medals.

Major Caleb Milne, of 3117 West Penn street, Germantown, arrived on the America. He went abroad as a captain, having been detached from the machine-gun company of the 10th Infantry at Camp Hancock and assigned to the quartermaster's depot in Paris. He was promoted to the rank of major three months ago.

After serving for ten months in Paris he was transferred to Barcelona, Spain, where he was purchasing agent for the department.

Twenty-eight nurses of Base No. 56 were also among the passengers. Included in the roster was Miss Edith—Everman, a graduate of Cooper Hospital, Camden, who lives at 51 North Thirty-ninth street. This unit went overseas last August and established itself at Abery, near Dijon, and had accommodations for 200 patients.

Most of the cases came from the St. Mihiel and Argonne offensives. Abery was an American hospital center, where 30,000 wounded men were treated at one time.

GRANDSON'S RESCUER RUN OVER BY TRAIN

Camden Watchman Killed by Locomotive After Dragging Boy From Tracks

A sixty-year-old man lies dead in his home in Camden today, the victim of a heroic attempt to save the life of his eleven-year-old grandson from the wheels of a shifting engine.

The man was John W. Pine, of 111 North Tenth street.

Pine, accompanied by the lad, was on his way to Market street to board a trolley car to go to his place of employment last night. He is a night watchman.

The boy had been gleefully talking about a promised outing and ran a few feet ahead of his grandfather. The tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad, forming a slight curve at Tenth and Market streets.

The lad paused a moment on the tracks to look at some object down the street. Suddenly a shifting engine appeared.

Without a moment's hesitation, Pine leaped forward, grasped the boy and threw him out of danger. Before he could jump from the tracks the train struck him. He was knocked down and the wheels passed over him. Pine was cut in two.

The lad ran home and told his parents of the tragedy, while the body was pronounced dead at the Cooper Hospital, Coroner Pratt, following an investigation, said the crew of the train appeared to be blameless. They were not arrested.

STUDY FINANCES HERE

Chilean Commission to Visit Hog Island in Tour of City

A Chilean financial commission arrived in Philadelphia this morning to spend the day in this city. It has been sent to the United States by the Chilean Government to study conditions in the large American cities, to look after the future trade relations between the two countries and to arrange for the purchase of supplies needed by that government.

Members of the commission are Elinodoro Yanez, Juan Enrique Tocornal, Augusto Villanueva, expert attaché; Enrique Bornster and Secretary Luis Yanez.

Met at Broad Street Station by members of the Chamber of Commerce, they were taken to the Union League Club and received by Ernest T. Trigg, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

This afternoon they will visit Baldwin Locomotive Works and will be taken to prominent financial institutions of the city. Tomorrow they will make a tour of Hog Island.

William J. McHugh Dies Suddenly

William J. McHugh, a veteran employee of the banking firm of Drexel & Co., died early today at his home, 1923 Rittenhouse street. He was at his desk yesterday and did not complain of feeling ill. Mr. McHugh was fifty-one years old and entered the Drexel employ when he was fifteen. For the last eighteen years he had been secretary of the Catholic Club of this city. He was a member of the Philopatrian Literary Institute, a trustee of St. John's Orphan Asylum and of St. Francis' Industrial School at Eddington.
