Deaths of a Day LOUIS ROSENBERG

Uncle of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Dies of Heart Disease. Louis Rosenberg, eighty-three years old, of 927 North Nineteenth street, died last evening from an attack of heart disease, with which he was stricken at the corner of Nineteenth and Girard avenues. He was on his way to the Mersault Club, of which he was a member, when he was stricken. He was taken to the Lankenau Hospital, where he was pronounced dead. Mr. Rosenberg was an uncle of Leo S. Rowe, assistant secretary of the Treasury. He was a retired manufacturer, living with his niece, Mrs. Louisa Teller.

Frederick Stritzinger, Sr. Norristown, Pa., May 8. Frederick G. Stritzinger, Sr., churchman, business man and citizen, died at his home yesterday at the age of eighty-seven years. He was born in Germany and emigrated to this country in 1854 on a boat which took forty-nine days to make the trip. He walked from Philadelphia to Norristown because he had no money and accepted a job here at \$1 a month. He started a bakery in Norristown in 1859 and prospered. At the time of his death he was one of the largest real-estate owners in Norristown.

Clairence E. Pryor. Clarence E. Pryor, who was a Republican leader of Lackawanna county a quarter of a century ago, died on Tuesday at his home, 536 South Forty-ninth street. While a resident of Scranton, Mr. Pryor served two terms as mayor and one term as sheriff of Lackawanna county. He was born in Hanover township, Luzerne county, seventy-four years ago. When a young man he had charge of a company store in the coal region, then he moved to Scranton and engaged in the stationery business. From Scranton he went to New York, where he remained a short time, and in 1902 came to Philadelphia, where he since had made his home.

Bernard Gray. Bernard Gray, sixty years old, a clerk in the registry division of the postoffice, in which he had been employed twenty-two years, died on Tuesday at his home, 1329 Shunk street. He had been in poor health since January. His wife died on May 4, last year. He is survived by three sons and four daughters. Two of the same name in the navy. Lieutenant Commander John P. B. J. Keogh. Shenandoah, Pa., May 8.—B. J. Keogh, forty-five years old, died last night of pneumonia. He was a leading manufacturer and bottler of temperance drinks, a director of the First National Bank, Mutual Building and Loan Association and Columbia Brewing Company. Mr. Keogh was also a volunteer fireman, member of the Eagles and Knights of Annunciation and a former member of the Board of Education.

George P. Goodale. Detroit, May 8.—George Paneroy Goodale, for more than fifty years connected with the Detroit Free Press and dean of American dramatic critics, died suddenly at his home here yesterday at the age of seventy-five.

IL CONCILIO DEI QUATTRO RIUNITO

Preparativi per Consegnare i Termini di Pace ai Delegati Austriaci, Ungheresi e Bulgari

Parigi, 8 maggio.—Il Concilio dei Quattro, con la presenza dell'On. Orlando per l'Italia, ha cominciato oggi a stabilire le modalità del programma per la presentazione dei termini di pace ai delegati austriaci, ungheresi e bulgari.

La storica riunione nella quale i rappresentanti della Germania riceveranno dagli Alleati e dalle Potenze associate il trattato di pace, che riduce la potenza militare della Germania, fu chiusa alle ore 7.51 del pomeriggio di ieri.

All'apertura della sessione del congresso della pace, Mr. Clemenceau disse: "Non è necessario che io usi parole superflue. Voi avete dinanzi a voi i plenipotenziari della grande e piccola potenza unite nella più cruenta guerra, la quale fu imposta sopra di essi. L'ora è arrivata per il grave aggiustamento dei conti."

Il Segretario generale alla Conferenza della Pace, Paolo Dastous, consegnò una copia del trattato al Conte von Brockdorff-Rantzau, il quale espose: "Noi dichiariamo che non possiamo negare l'unità della nostra disfatta. Noi riconosciamo che la potenza militare della Germania è stata abbattuta. Egli fu inabile di ammettere che la Germania fu la sola colpevole e domandò che gli Alleati facessero una pace secondo i punti del Presidente Wilson. La Germania disse che avrebbe proceduto a finanziare i danni cagionati al Belgio ed alle ricostruzioni nei territori della Francia settentrionale.
