GOSSIP OF THE STREET.

DISCUSS PROBABLE CAUSES FOR SMALL RAILS' ACTIVITY

'Wise Ones" May See Importance of Linking Up Big Systems When U. S. Returns Carriers, Says Banker—Gossip of the Street

"How do you account for the recent activity in what are known as the 'little' railroads?" was the question put to a banker whose house is largely interested in railroad securities. In reply he said he had been told that the possibilities of oil discoveries in land owned by a number of these roads, or in lands contiguous to them, and thereby adding to their freight carnings, if nothing more, were responsible. "But," he added, "after all, there are very few of these roads which in the long run could hope to profit in either of these ways." He said he believed the real reason for the activity in the small roads was the result of the wise ones anticipating the importance of these little fellows when the time comes to link up the big systems in the plans which are said to be contemplated in the return of the roads to the stockholders

It is worth considering that every prominent railroad man is opposed to a return to the old system and that the most favored plan at the present time contemplates a regional system formed on a basis similar to that of the Federal Reserve Bank system. In that system the little banks became quite important and have remained so, and it is natural to presume that these little links will play an important part in the final solution of the revised railroad system.

A broker when discussing the subject of the "little" roads said he agreed with the conclusions arrived at above. He said when John Moody, the well-known financial expert and statistician, was in the city a few days ago he advocated the retention of the railroads by the government for another year, until the theorists and extremists for government ownership have had enough of their own medicine, and until the railroad deficits pile up to a figure which must be raised by taxation so heavy that its teeth will be felt, and then the people, who have to pay the piper, will rise up and condemn forever the principle of government ownership.

"He said that Mr. Moody expressed the fear that if the roads were returned now the present conditions would be too soon forgotten and people would listen again to the advocates of government ownership when the next wave of such a sentiment sweeps over the country.

In some other quarters the activity in rails is attributed to the news that Congress had been called for a special session. Constructive legislation

is looked for, especially in regard to the railroads. Traders Do Not Object to Brokers' Larger Commissions

The new rates of commission for brokers mentioned in this column some days ago as being under consideration by the governing committee of the New York Stock Exchange went late effect yesterday, owing, it was said, to the default of a majority of the members to vote against their inauguration.

These rates must also be charged by Philadelphia brokers on transactions in the local market covering issues listed in New York.
