

**FRAUD CHARGE DENIED BY GEORGE J. GOULD**

Accusations Are "Inaccurate and Distinctly Misleading," Sister Says

**FAMILY ANIMOSITIES SEEN**

New York, May 9.—George J. Gould, eldest son of Jay Gould, one of America's foremost financiers, whom he succeeded in the management of the extensive Gould system of railroads and nominal head of the family, was accused in the Supreme Court yesterday of causing a loss of \$25,000,000 in the estate of his father, who died December 2, 1892, leaving a fortune then of \$83,000,000.

His accuser is Frank Jay Gould, youngest member of the family, whose allegations are supported by the Duchesse de Talleyrand, formerly Miss Anna Gould, and attorneys representing several of the grandchildren.

In attacking his elder brother, Frank Gould demands his removal as trustee of the estate, which has been jointly managed by George, Howard and Edwin Gould and Mrs. Helen Gould Shepard. The charge is that George J. Gould used funds of the estate for personal gain, perpetrated fraud upon his brothers and sisters and manipulated the vast railroad holdings left by his father to retain his prominence in the business world, finally deserting the estate's interests when a financial stringency loomed before him.

In an answering affidavit George Gould denies the charges and is supported by a deposition made by Mrs. Shepard, who declares the charges are "inaccurate and distinctly misleading." Four of the six children of Jay Gould, George, Helen, Edwin and Howard, are co-trustees of their father's estate. Frank and Anna were not included, as both are residents of France. Frank Gould lives in Paris, where he recently obtained a divorce from his second wife, Mrs. Edith Kelly Gould, a former actress.

Personal animosities existing between the Gould family were bare in the voluminous papers filed with the court. In these George and Edwin are revealed as opposed to Frank's second marriage, refusing to receive his wife into their families, with the breach further widened by Frank's successful fight against their control of certain railroads.

The extreme hostility in the family became known yesterday, when Justice Platzer signed the application of Walter B. Walker, attorney for Frank, requiring George to show cause why he should not be removed as trustee of the estate. It required 273 closely typewritten pages in affidavit form for Frank to detail his charges.
