## DOCUMENTS FILED IN COURT

New York, May 10 .- In defending himself from the attack of Frank J. Gould, his brother, George J. Gould quotes letters that passed between himself and his father, Jay Gould, founder of the fortune. The letters are on file in the Supreme Court, where Frank Gould and his sister, Anna, the Duchess de Talleyrand, are seeking to have George removed as a trustee of the estate upon the ground of alleged mismanagement.

In March, 1892, the year he died. Jay Gould wrote his son George :

'My dear son-Do not work hard. Take plenty of outdoor exercise and plenty of air. I dare not think what would happen if anything went wrong with you. So, my dear boy, for my sake comply with the foregoing." Jay Gould wrote his son again on
