Romig and Webb Among 18 Candidates for Crew to Row in Schuylkill Regatta

CASEY RETURNS WITH '28TH'

With the rowing squad of eighteen young huskies to pick from, Coach Edwin Marsh, of the Malta Boat Club, believes that the prospects for putting a strong junior eight in the field for the Schuylkill Navy Regatta on June 21, are very bright.

The majority of the men are new at the rowing game and Marsh has fixed a section of a shell with a sliding seat and outrigger on the club ship in order to teach the men the rudiments of sweep rowing before boating them. He says the results so far have been very satisfactory.

In the squad are Romig, who rowed bow oar in the Central High School eights of 1913, 1914 and 1915, and Webb who rowed in the West Philadelphia High School crews of 1913 and 1914.

Among the other aspirants for junior sweep honors at the Malta Club are Fred and John Knowlan, who rowed in the Malta junior eight in 1916, and Pengelly, who also has had some rowing experiences and has just mustered out of the service.

Williamson, Tissard, Clark, A. C. Hirt, Webford, Orlando and Bower are others in the squad who have shown up well in preliminary try-outs.

James B. Casey, one of the star oarsmen of the Pennsylvania Rowing Club, has just returned from France, with the Twenty-eighth Division. He has been attached to headquarters artillery and saw service in the Argonne, Champagne and other battlefronts. He intends to start training immediately.

Palmer Rowing Association has a junior four-oared gig in training, which will start rowing on June 21. The crew consists of Turner, Coxswain, A. C. Schmidt, William H. S. Smith and other rowers. He has trained his six-oared gig, which has started training in his single scull, despite his age, won the single scull event for veterans in the last two regattas held by the club.

Lindsay Johnson and Edward W. Hoffman, Jr. will row for the University Barge Club in the senior single sculling event of the American Regatta, which will be in the first singles and sculling in the second.

LAWN TENNIS ASSOCIATION SUSPENDS VINCENT RICHARDS

Holder of Six National Titles Barred From Courts for "Use of Name to Promote Sale of Goods for Profit"

New York, May 12.—Vincent Richards, the sixteen-year-old national doubles and national singles indoor lawn tennis champion, and potentially one of the greatest players ever developed in the United States, has been debarred by the United States Lawn Tennis Association from playing in any amateur tournaments in this country.

The decision to expel the New York boy from the ranks of the amateurs was reached at a meeting of the amateur rule committee, held in this city on April 28.

The remarkable boy player may be restored to good amateur standing, but only after he has satisfied the United States National Lawn Tennis Association that he has entirely severed his connection with the sporting goods house in question, and it is probable, even then, if no extenuating circumstances are shown, that Richards will have to submit to a long term of probation before being again admitted to the fold.
