

PARADE SPECTATORS Home Defense Reserves, Marine

The regular police force, home defense reserves, marine guards, provost guard, detectives and even the park guards played their part in the handling of the crowds banking the streets along which the Iron Division parade moved Traffic was stopped within a square of the marching doughboys during the parade. No vehicle was permitted within a radius of a block of the route and the lines at no time were broken to permit any traffic. Trolley cars to permit any traffic. Trolley cars were diverted so they did not interfere with the marching men. The plan, however, permitted their operating on something approaching the usual schedules

Crates, boxes, baskets, chairs and other one-man stands were barred by the police. The streets were kept unobstructed from curb to curb Captain of Detectives Souder and 300 men mingled in the crowds and en-deavor to protect the spectators from the

operations of pickpockets. All suspi-cious persons were arrested and held until after the parade. until after the parade. The entire police body of 3740 men-remained on duty during the hours of the parade. They were assisted by 2300 home defense reserves and were further augmented by the murine police and the provost guard. Members of the park guard policed the Parkway. Dr. Hubley R. 
