MRS. WILSON TELLS HOW TO KEEP EGGS

Proper Directions for Preserving in Waterglass—Making Wax Paper for Top of Jars—Cooking After Removing From Liquid Solution

THERE is no other single article of food, either animal or vegetable in character, which is more commonly used the world over or served in greater variety than the egg.

When the jar is full to within four inches of the top turn a plate over the eggs and then fill the crock with the prepared waterglass solution.

Melt the paraffin and then spread paper on a flat surface. Now with a cheap paint brush thoroughly coat both sides of the paper.

Large glass bowls or new wooden buckets may also be used. If using new wooden ware, keep the fact in mind that it must be soaked in cold water for forty-eight hours to season it.

Duck eggs may be treated in the same manner as hen eggs, and they can be used to replace hen eggs for baking.

Wash the eggs after removing from the liquid solution and then with the point of a fine needle make a tiny hole at the large end of the egg.

For frying, poaching, omelets, souffles and custards, as well as for baking, these eggs will be found to be splendid.

You know that it was just such prudent and careful conserving of our grandparents that helped to tide over the long, lean winters and provided abundant food for the family.
