WHEN PERRY TWIRLS MACKS FAIL TO HIT

Have Tallied Two Runs in Four Games With Scott in Box

HAS LOST FIVE CONTESTS

Chicago, May 20.—If there is any young man who has a right to kick about the failure of the A's to get runs this season it is Scott Perry, the big Oklahoma hurler. He has been in there pitching his head off and he has lost five straight.

Four of his defeats have been on the road, and in those four games, which embraced four consecutive days, two of them being extra-inning battles, the A's have scored the grand total of two runs.

His first reverse was against Walter Johnson on opening day in Washington, and the game went thirteen innings before Scott dropped the decision, 1 to 0. Next he hurled in New York and lost, 2 to 0. His third road exhibition was in St. Louis, and the A's were humiliated in the regulation distance, 11 to 0. On Sunday he was beaten here by Eddie Cicotte, 1 to 0.

Perry Hopeful
But is Perry kicking? Has he lost confidence in his teammates? Here is what he has to say about it:

"We're sticking around the cellar in this league now," he asserted, "but when July and August seasons around this way there, or I don't know baseball. The boys haven't been doing much hitting, but that isn't natural. Men like Burns, Roth and Walker are consistent 300 hitters and they're going to go up as sure as the country's going dry. We're playing in St. Louis now, but I believe we're off already. Let some of the boys get a few more base hits and they'll get the old confidence, and once they get the confidence you'll see some real hitting."

Doesn't Blame Batsmen

"You know, you can't expect too much of our hitters. You must remember that they didn't see any real big-league pitching until opening day, and then there has been so much rain and cold weather that their eyes aren't in trim yet."

"In the other departments of the game we have been going along good. You wouldn't want to see smarter fielding than the boys showed in the first two games here, and the pitching isn't been good, too. I realize that I haven't been up to the standard and the other boys have pitched better than I have. But I feel now that I'm on my way to better form. I had a lot of confidence against the Sox and I was licked, and I'll get licked again, often; but there's not a game that I go into that I don't feel that I'll win. That sounds egotistical, I know, but no one would be much unless the confidence is there, and I just said that to show you I had the confidence."
