DEATH KNELL OF "SHIMMY" WILL SOUND HERE MAY 31

State Law Makes Mayor Censor of Dance Hall "Clinches." Curfew for Minors to Ring at 9 o'Clock

Midnight of May 31 will see the end in Philadelphia of "shimmy" dances and all other indecorous gyrations of the human body to jazzy tunes and will usher in Mayor Smith as chief censor of the waxed floor.

Father Penn has looked frowningly upon ballroom clinches and, beginning June 1, mayors of Pennsylvania cities of the first, second and third classes, through the medium of their respective police departments, will assume the role of censor.

Dance hall proprietors and their patrons and devotees of the more stately ballroom are finding consolation for the city regulation of the dance in the fact that Mayor Smith himself likes to trip the light fantastic toe on occasion, and they are hopeful that he will be lenient in his supervision.

"Nothing that is not decorous will be permitted," is the dictum that went out from City Hall today after the Mayor had scrutinized the dance regulation bill, signed by the Governor yesterday.

U. P. Commencement June 19
Provost Smith today announced that the trustees had decided to hold the annual commencement this year on Thursday, June 19, instead of Wednesday, June 18, as previously announced.

The dancing curfew for minors under sixteen years will ring at 9 o'clock p. m. All dances must end at 1 o'clock a. m., except when special permit has been obtained to continue until 2 o'clock.

More than 300 dancing establishments in Philadelphia will be affected by the new law, Charles Dalemple, the Mayor's license clerk, will have charge of the issuance of dancing permits.

GIRARD SERVICE FLAG BEARS 24 GOLD STARS

Four Alumni Officers Killed in France—Several Former Students Decorated

Girard College, which celebrated its seventy-first anniversary on Monday last, has twenty-four gold stars on its flag in honor of alumni who gave their lives for their country.

Among the names of officers on the roll are Lieutenant Charles C. Smith, '05; Lieutenant Frank D. Howe, '14, and Captain Claude C. Cunningham, '08.

Incidentally, when lives of wounded soldiers were being saved and ambulances were being driven under heavy shellfire to the rescue of some half-brother mass of humanity and camel scouts were being flown across the enemy's lines, Girard's finest were with the bravest, and recognition of the courage and valor of at least a few is shown in the following citations:

Howard W. Bitner, '08, has been awarded the Croix de Guerre for saving the lives of a number of men by picking up and throwing a land grenade in which the fuse had been accidentally set off, as it rested on an ammunition dump.

Harold K. Gruel, '13, awarded the Croix de Guerre for acting with coolness and devotion under fire.

Lieutenant Earl L. Ranek, '09, has had the Italian Service Ribbon bestowed upon him for distinguished service in Italy.

These of the best drill masters at the training camps on this side were former Girard boys. They were Captains Frederick Hickman, '07, at Camp Lee, Emory L. King, '04, at Camp Meade, and William Stewart Williams, '07, at Camp Dix. All of these men, after spending considerable time in training men for the other side, later took command of their own to France.
