CAMPAIGN ENDS TONIGHT

The Catholic Church of St. Carthage, Bixty-third and Cedar avenue, one of the "youngest" in the archdiocese, head the list of parishes in collections for the Friends of Irish Freedom campaign for \$150,000 here for Irish propaganda. according to announcement today from headquarters. The list includes only those churches which have already reported their totals to the committee. Many others have large subscriptions to their credit which will be reported be-fore the close of the drive tonight with banquet in the Continental Hotel.

The campaign totals so far recorded aggregate about \$95,000. Some of the largest parishes throughout the city are holding back their subscriptions until the closing day.
