PRINCETON IN DUAL MEET WITH HARVARD

THE fact that Yale has beaten both Princeton and Harvard in dual meetings this year with about the same margin of points adds considerable attraction to this meet today.

Yale's success was due in both cases to their strength in the field events, so that it looks as if the teams of Harvard and Princeton are built along the same lines. Harvard seems to have the bulge on the Tigers in the sprints, while Princeton is strong in the hurdles. In the other events it will be a toss up and the meet will be very close.

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North Hills Players Win Two Dinners From Fans

Jim Hackney and Preston Stuckey Promised It Them if They'd Beat Bala—Mrs. Barlow Again Leads Women Golfers

PRESTON H. STUCKEY, chairman of the golf committee at the North Hills Country Club, and Jim Hackney, the golf professional there, told the members of the North Hills team that if they won the division championship they would get a dinner. This means two dinners, for both men are going to stand treat for a big feed amice.

This was after North Hills played Bucks county, and their showing against the Langhorne was not as good as it should have been. The result was that the team was on its toes when it met Bala, for the Bala players led them by three points and that dinner looked far away.

But they got away with it, and so all the players are getting ready for the two big dinners. Charlie Hech has suggested that the Bala players be the special guests of honor, but the players refuse to take him seriously and the dinners will be for the members of the two teams only.

A lot of golfers would not have given a plugged nickel for the chances of the North Hills players, for the reports that came from Bala were most alarming, and some of the members of the club who were not on the team ironically suggested that the best way out would be for the team to default, for from what they heard North Hills did not have a chance.

But Jimmie Hackney and Preston Stuckey told the players that the Bala team was not as hard a nut to crack as the men supposed and, judging from the way the Edge Hill men ate up the Bala players, there was a lot of truth in their statements.

Bala Top Heavy The trouble with Bala was that the team was top heavy. They had some corking good players in the first two places, but below that they were not as good. And it was the last four or five men on the North Hills team at home and away that delivered most of the goods.

Those will certainly be big nights at the North Hills Club, and the noise will be heard for miles. But it will be temperance noise, for the club has no grill. Mrs. Barlow beat both Mrs. Vanderbeck and Miss Caverly in the semifinal and final rounds largely because of the wonderful start she got on both of the Club players. In the final she certainly needed the big lead she had over Miss Caverly, for the younger player had her going the second nine and snarling for wind, as a fight fan expressed it at St. Martin's.

Praise Mrs. Justice All in all, it was a wonderfully fine tournament, and Mrs. W. Justice, Jr., the secretary of the Women's Golf Association, deserves a lot of praise for the fine way she ran it. All the matches started on time, and there were no delays and the committee had no disputes to settle. And the way the Women's Golf Association run their tournament events is a joy.

Without detracting at all from the honors won by the new champion, the great majority of the women and men players wanted to see the championship go to Mrs. Clarence H. Vanderbeck, who is making her appearance again after a lapse of two years. She played some very fine golf, but she was unable to overcome the lead of Mrs. Barlow.

Hats Off to Champion And that was the trouble with Miss Caverly. No one could have beaten that fine 40 of Mrs. Barlow for the first nine holes. It was supergolf. It was not until the tenth hole that Miss Caverly won a hole, and when she started to come back she came back with a vengeance. Three holes in a row went to her and Mrs. Barlow's lead was shrinking fast. That half-topped shot to the thirteenth green certainly came at the psychological moment, for had the younger player got a half there the match might have had another ending.

But Mrs. Barlow deserves all the praise that can be showered on her, and her golf, except for a few slumps, was of a very fine order and of a very rare degree.
