

# 312TH ARTILLERYMEN TO DISBAND THIS WEEK

Pennsylvanians Arriving at Newport News Slated for Demobilization Soon

MACHINE GUN UNIT DOCKS

The 312th Heavy Field Artillery, of the Seventy-ninth Division, in which many Philadelphians are serving, will be demobilized some time this week.

The 312th landed at Newport News yesterday along with Virginia units of the Twenty-ninth Division and Pennsylvanians and Virginians united in giving the men a rousing welcome. The 11th Machine-Gun Battalion also was on board the big transport from St. Nazaire.

More than 40,000 persons virtually went wild as the transport bearing the sun-tanned and battle-scarred warriors came into the harbor. The crew had waited three hours for the troopship, which had been delayed, and in those three hours enough enthusiasm was kindled to welcome appropriately an entire division.

The twelve steamers filled with the newcomers went down to meet the Virginia, preceded by the airplanes, immediately after landing, the Philadelphians, following a regiment of Virginians, marched to Camp Hill.

Colonel Harry D. Willour, commander of the 312th, made a brief speech on the pier of his command, from the entry into the fight last September to the signing of the armistice.

Every man in the regiment, the colonel declared, is an ardent admirer of Major General Kuhn, Liberty Division commander. The men told, with a great deal of pride, how the general advanced to the first lines of defense and offense, and how on two occasions his horse was shot under him.

Lieutenant Thomas P. White, of Elizabeth, N. J., came off the transport in command of headquarters company. His unit is composed almost entirely of Philadelphians, and he said he is proud to be associated with them.

Battery A was in charge of First Sergeant Stephen Leibel, of West Girard avenue, Philadelphia, and Battery B had Captain John W. Stroever, of Chester, in command. The men said their trip had not been altogether pleasant, but they had forgotten the trials of the past in the joy of being home again.

The Virginia regiment was the first to leave the pier, and was followed by the 312th. The Philadelphians' band led the organization, and it passed down a line of persons for almost a mile, until they had reached the outskirts of the city. Nearly 50,000 persons were there to greet them.

Frequent rest periods were given the men along the route, and when they had passed through the arch of triumph, erected by the city in honor of all of America's heroes, they were met by a string of army trucks and were allowed to pile their packs on board.

At camp they were given quarters, which they declared are palatial in comparison with some they had known over there. Early tomorrow night they will be put through the sanitary process.

Lieutenant Carl D. Montgomery, 3221 West Penn street, Queen Lane, and Corporal Thomas W. Harper, 2113 South Fifty-eighth street, Philadelphia, were among those who talked to new-comers men in camp this afternoon. They told some of the experiences of the division in France.

They were in the fight in the Argonne, and have been credited with the capture of Montfacon, which the British took last year was irreparable. But they took the stronghold in three days, with terrific losses to the enemy. It was here also, they said, that General Kuhn displayed remarkable coolness and endeared his men to him by his daring.

The 311th Machine-Gun Battalion of the Seventy-ninth, in command of Major Stephen G. Henry, of Louisiana, followed the 312th off the ship and on to camp. They operated in the Argonne and suffered many casualties.

The unit was originally composed chiefly of Pennsylvanians, but owing to casualties now contains many replacements.
