BREAK LOSING STREAK

Detroit, Mich., May 27.—The A's have strayed far along the lane that isn't straight and narrow in baseball pathways, but they returned to the right road yesterday.

The punch in a pinch that had been lacking for many days was discovered and the old fight was regained.

It all happened against the Tigers at Navin Field when, for the first time in seven years, the A's won a ball game, and won it by coming from behind when victory seemed to have gone already to the dugout on the other side of the field.

Fight Continually

Twice the tallenders went out in front only to be passed by the fast-stepping Tigers, but they kept on fighting and broke one of the worst losing streaks in the history of the club and incidentally ruined a straight run of five wins piled up by the ambitious Bengals.

Scott Perry, one of the biggest sensations in 1918 pitching circles, was credited with his first win of the season; a Mackman eluded out the first Athletic home run of the year, and the 1919 consecutive winning record of the Shibe family was equalled in one afternoon.

Perry did not finish the game, and he was out of the line-up before the A's took the lead in the eighth, but walloping Wally Kinney was not the official pitcher until the Mackmen held the advantage, so Perry gets credit for his first win.

It is only fair that the Oklahoma hurler should be marked up for a victory. He pitched seven of the nine frames and, although he was bumped hard in the sixth, he flung good ball in the other sessions.

Roth Soaks Homer

Four of the seven whacks went for extra bases. Captain Bobby Roth started the Mackmen on their winning streak with a home run over the left field wall in the fourth. Walker, Dierks and Kinney all contributed doubles.

More pleasing even than the victory to Mack was the fact that our athletes displayed.

"It looks to me," said Mack, "as if we were started at last. The boys were in there fighting all the time, and more so when they were behind. Nothing seemed to discourage them and when they show that kind of spirit you can expect some more victories."

Toledo, O., May 27.—Failing to receive any official word from Jess Willard concerning his departure from Los Angeles, Tex Rickard, promoter of the heavyweight championship battle between Willard and Jack Dempsey here July 4th, today telegraphed the champion requesting him to start for Toledo immediately.

Rickard had nothing to add today to his statement in regard to the bill introduced in the Ohio Legislature yesterday, which would grant Governor Cox authority to revoke the permit issued by the Toledo boxing commission for the Willard-Dempsey match.
