CHAMP DUE HERE ON JUNE 4

Toledo, O., May 28.—Eight hundred former soldiers will be deputized as special police and serve as ushers for the heavyweight championship contest between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey in the Bayview Park arena here July 4.

These men all have served overseas as members of the 112th Ammunition Train and Batteries B and E of the Thirty-second Division. They will be armed, and will be under the direct supervision of Mayor Scheffler and C. F. Wall, director of public safety.

As the army, navy and civilian board of boxing control endorsed the contest and announced that it would support it, Promoter Rickard believed it would be in justice to the men on this board to appoint soldiers to assist in handling the crowds.

Rickard's action will make it possible for many of these overseas men to witness the contest, for many of them lack the necessary funds to purchase tickets.
