

ERSHING MAY COME HOME NEXT MONTH

Should Germans Refuse Peace Terms, However, He Will Renew Hostilities

PLANS CAREFULLY GUARDED

Washington, June 6.—If the Germans sign the peace treaty some time this month General Pershing will return to the United States in July after a stay of about two years in France, War Department officials believe.

It is expected that with the probability of a renewal of the war against Germany removed General Pershing will come home without delay and leave the American army of occupation in charge of Major General Hunter Liggett, who is now actually in command of the American forces in the occupied enemy territory.

The War Department is maintaining the greatest secrecy about the probable return of General Pershing for obvious reasons. It is realized that if the Germans refuse to accept the peace treaty the American army of about 200,000 now centered about Coblenz will immediately go forward into German territory along with the French and British forces. That General Pershing will be in charge of the American force if hostilities are resumed there is no doubt.

Secretary Baker, when asked upon his return from France when Pershing was coming home, said: "General Pershing told me not to expect him before July 1." Then he quickly added: "But that is, of course, if nothing happens, and there is nothing very sure about it, either."

The question has often arisen at the War Department as to who will know when it is time for Pershing to return home and who will give him orders. It is generally believed that the American commander himself will determine when his task is done and will suggest his return and the issuance of the proper instructions.

"What shall we do with Pershing after we get him home?" is the question most seriously agitating Secretary Baker and War Department officials. If he is not given the most desirable position in the War Department, but is shunted off to some military post, it is sure to give rise to severe criticism and charges like that made when General Leonard Wood was ordered to Camp Funston, that he is being "buried" as the result of army politics.

WOMAN TO FOLLOW HAWKER

Ruth Law Says She Will Take Same Route Across Ocean

Cleveland, O., June 6.—(By A. P.)—Ruth Law, who recently announced she would attempt a transatlantic airplane flight this summer, said yesterday she will go over the route Harry Hawker attempted to use from Newfoundland to Ireland.

Miss Law was here conferring with an airplane manufacturer, regarding construction of a machine for the flight. She said she will use a two-engine machine, but has not determined on the make.

COSTA RICA EXPELS FOE

Invaders All Driven Out—Seek Haven in Nicaragua

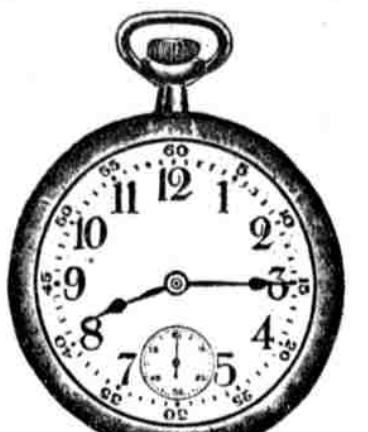
Washington, June 6.—(By A. P.)—The invading forces have been completely driven out of Costa Rican territory and have taken refuge in Nicaragua, said a cablegram received today by Carlos Lara, Costa Rican representative here. The message further stated it was believed the Nicaraguan government would concentrate against the forces and thus prevent the shedding of blood and the stringing up of hatred between the two republics.

"No American marines have been landed in any Costa Rican port," Mr. Lara added. "There is no reason whatsoever for them to land unless it would be on a mission of courtesy and friendship."

SNOW 5000 MILES AWAY

Argentine Suffers From Heaviest Storm of Recent Years

Buenos Aires, June 6.—(By A. P.)—The heaviest snowstorm in recent years probably has stopped communication between Argentina and the United States by way of the trans-Andine railway and the west coast until spring. Snow slides, one of which is estimated to have carried down a hundred tons of snow, have torn up the trans-Andine railway at points and wrecked the bridges, making it impossible to operate the bi-weekly train between Buenos Aires and Valparaiso.
