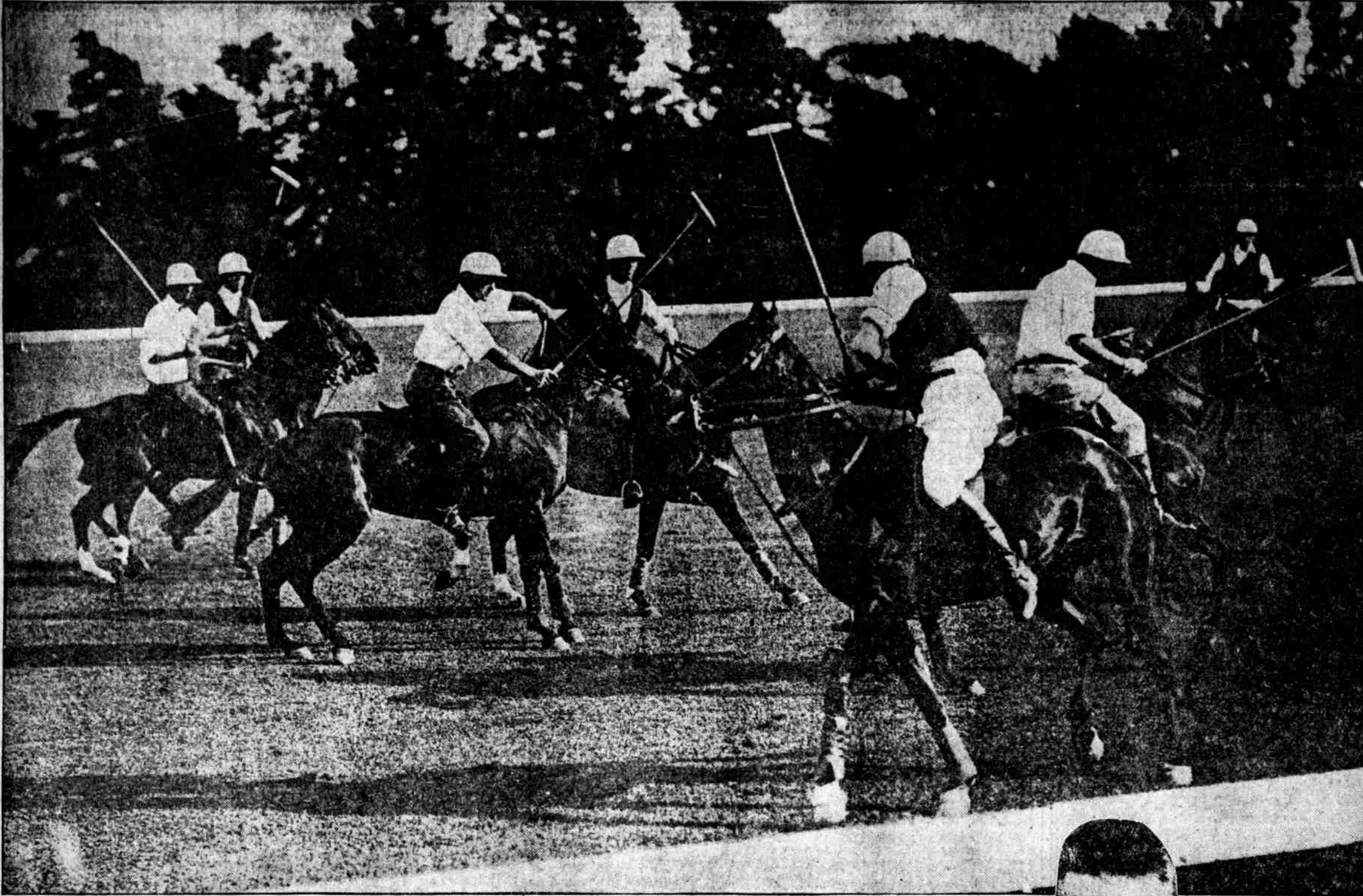


Opening of Polo Season : Speed Stars Seek World Records : Signing Suffrage Resolution

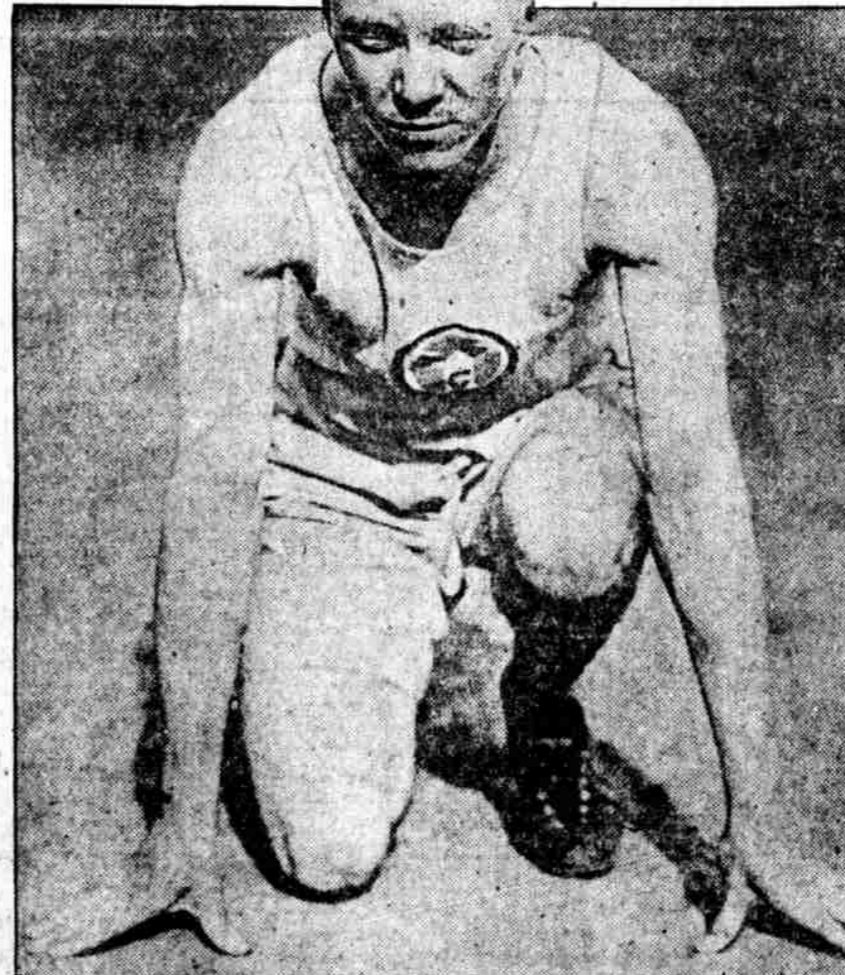


JOIE RAY, speedy western miler, working out on Franklin Field.

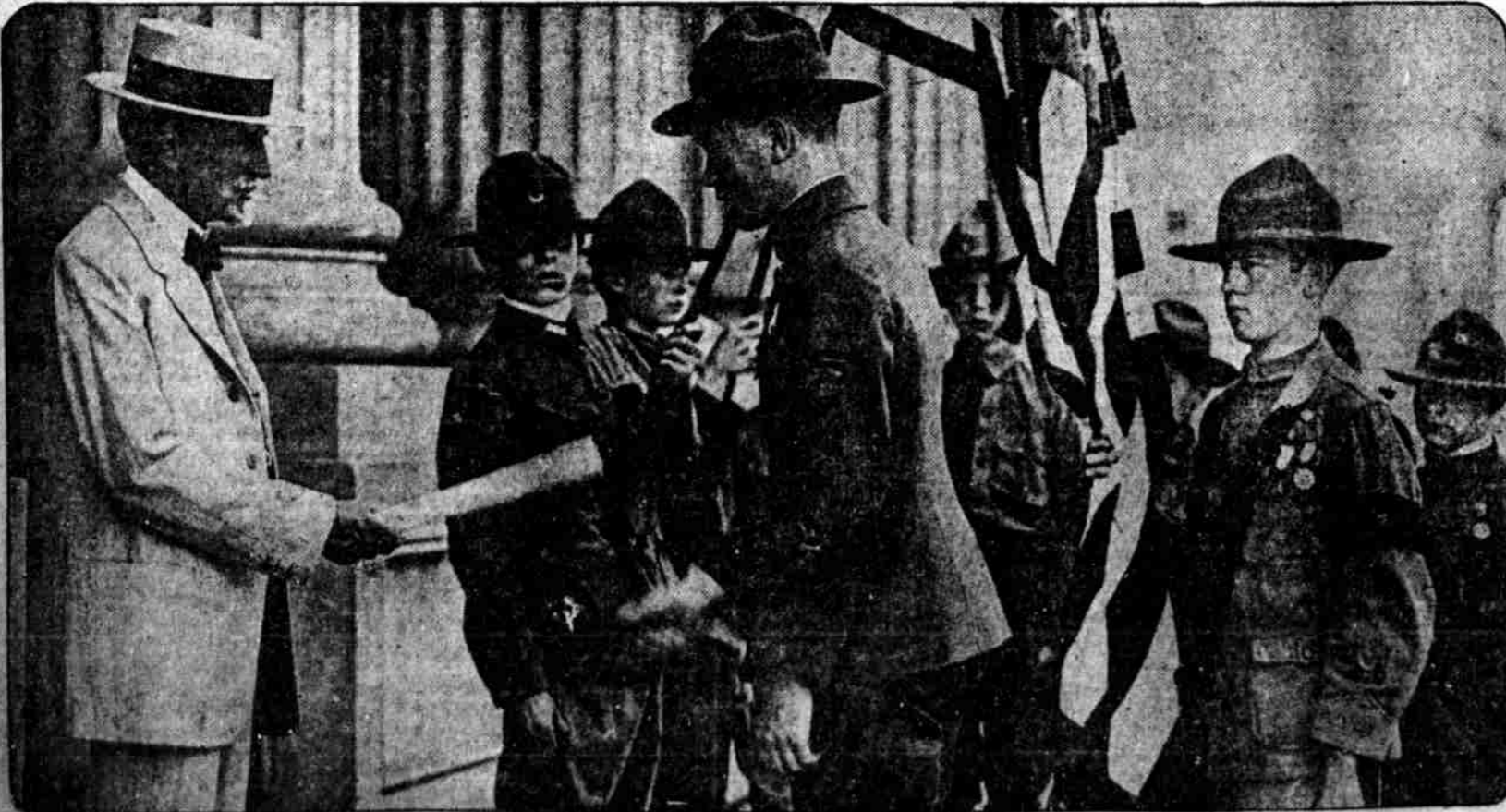
