

The League Island Hospital, containing accommodations for 900 patients. has just been completed and put into operation

The new hospital occupies an area about equal to that of a city block and is situated in one of the most healthful sections of the island.

The buildings are of white stucco and arranged in a quadrangle about a loog mess hall. There are two wards in each building comprising thirty beds and three quiet rooms each.
