Cravath, Unaffected by Phil Disaster in West, Gathered Nineteen Hits for Thirty-six Bases

AS STILL HITTING

POOR, Old Thirty-Seven Year Gavy Cravath! Slow at running, stiff at joints and gray at temples, he is stout at heart, young in spirit and wicked at bat.

"Shoot, if you must, this gray-old-head" has turned to "Strike out, if you can, this gray-young head." And they're very few who are doing it. The old war horse of the West is the best of the 1919 youngsters and the "find" of the present campaign.

Trailing along with a loser and passing through the tribulations of thirteen straight reverses have not affected Wooden Shoes. The turn around the western end of the circuit which has been so disastrous to the Phils in general has been a hay-making trip for the veteran.

Nineteen hits for thirty-six bases in six games in the fourteen games played out yonder. Six doubles, three triples and two home runs are mixed in the nineteen singles, and in only one game has he gone hitless. He has at least one safety in the last six engagements.

Poor Phils Here Today
The poor Phils, victims in thirteen of their last fourteen flits, exhibit before the admiring public with their worthy opponents the Boston Braves, worthy opponents of the Boston Braves, this afternoon. The Braves are worthy opponents, because it will be a battle for last place. The Combsmen are one and a half games north of the cellar.

The Phils have been doing a lot of hitting in the West. The main trouble before the other clubs have done more, which, of course, is a small matter. There's no fault to be found with the hitting of the club, but the athletes are slow runners and mediocre fielders, and the pitching has been miserable.

An average of almost eight hits for eleven bases per game in the West isn't so bad, but an average of almost two errors per game isn't so good. In their fourteen contests the Phils have gathered 108 hits for 155 sacks, but have committed twenty-six errors. Thirty-eight runs have been scored.

Compare these figures with the records of rival clubs. The opposition put over seventy-nine runs, made 141 hits for 188 bases and was guilty of only sixteen errors. The rival average per game is five and one-half runs, ten hits for thirteen bases and a fraction over one error.
