Bulgarian Break, Planned by the Kaiser

"The Bulgarians were suspicious ef the Germans, and the Germans mis-trusted the Bulgarians. As the food supplies of the poor Bulgarian peasants were drained for consumption by the Prussian landowners this feeling grew day by day. Finally, instead of the break with America, as desired by the kaiser. Bulgaria broke with Germany itself."

This was the story of Bulgaria's participation in the war as told yesterday by Dominic I. Murphy, of this city, consul general at Sofia, Bulgaria, to the Associated Alumni of the Central High School, which met last night at the school building. The city of Sofia, Mr. Murphy said,
