CELEBRATE HOFFNER DAY ON PHILMONT CLUB LINKS

George Wins Qualifying Round in Battle for Amateur Golf Championship of Philadelphia: Goes Round in 152 Strokes

YESTERDAY was Hoffner Day in gold.

The qualifying round for the amateur championship of Philadelphia was staged over the Philmont Country Club's links, where Charley Hoffner holds sway as pro. This same round was won by Charles's brother George, who hales from Bala, Bob, the youngest of the fraternal golfing trio, was missing.

All of the Hoffner boys were in their unpleasantry against the well-known woodchopper of Potomac. George has won the Philadelphia title in 1918, and he is just mentioned to show the acumen of the Hoffner family.

At any rate, George played a remarkable eighteen holes of golf yesterday. He did 70 in the morning and had the same card in the afternoon. But just to make it unanimous, he went in the first round in 37, came in in 30 and duplicated the feat in the afternoon, which proves that his steady game, that has wobbled a bit since he won the tournament at Shawnee, has returned with a rush.

George has played a remarkable game all this season. He won the tournament at Shawnee and was beaten for the qualifying medal by only Reggie Worth club bettering him. He won at North Hills and captured the qualifying medal at Bala.

Sydney Sharwood, who came second in the qualifying round, had the best eighteen-hole score, a 75, which he negotiated in the morning. Reynolds, Aronimink; Norman H. Maxwell, Overbrook, and Pat Grant, of the Philadelphia Cricket Club, tied up for third place with 150, followed by J. H. Gay, Jr., Cricket Club, with 160.

Only three men failed to qualify, and one of those was forced to quit on account of illness after playing the twelfth hole in the afternoon. Match play was booked to begin this morning at 9:30 o'clock.

One 'Cap' Falls In the play yesterday for the intercollegiate team championship at Merion, which was won by Princeton, all of the captains competing led their respective

teams except H. W. Maxwell, Princeton. But the Tigers won in spite of the fact that their captain did not even qualify in the lowest four.

Princeton was favorite to do so through with the team title and did so with ease, beating Harvard out by 31 strokes in the 72 holes of play. Princeton's total was 1355, while the Crimson amassed 1380.

Penn failed to keep up in the race and lost in her effort to win third place with Harry one more stroke than Harvard. Penn had a total of 1410. Columbia was a bad fifth with 1480, and Williams was left trailing in the dust with 1513 strokes, 158 strokes higher than Princeton.

The qualifying round, eighteen holes, was scheduled for this morning and the first round of match play this afternoon. Tomorrow the second and third rounds will be played and the final, thirty-six holes, on Saturday afternoon.
