

### NATIONAL TENNIS PLANS COMPLETED

George T. Adee Will Be Referee of Six Championships at Forest Hills

WILL START PLAY AUGUST 25

New York, June 27.—Plans for the national lawn tennis championship tournament which will begin on August 25 on the West Side Tennis Club courts at Forest Hills virtually were completed at a meeting of the tournament committee, of which Julian S. Myrick is chairman.

This committee from the club acts with the one representing the United States National Lawn Tennis Association—George T. Adee, Edwin F. Torrey, C. Frederick Watson, Jr. The preliminary arrangements involve several changes which are expected to find favor with all interested.

Because six championships are to be decided at this tournament it has a broad appeal. In addition to the national singles title the others are the junior and boys' championships in singles and doubles, the veterans' championship and the father and son championship. Players of note from other countries are likely to take part. An Australian team is almost sure to compete.

A change which doubtless will be appreciated by visiting players will be an attempt to provide entertainment for them. This generally has been limited to a dinner, but with the restraint of wartime conditions removed this year it was considered desirable to provide more definite means of entertainment. Stuart Johnston and Charles S. Landers have this in charge.

Harry Parker will handle the tickets, as in past seasons, and these will soon be available at 101 Park avenue. The prices remain as usual, with the addition of the war tax. Season tickets good for a seat during the whole tournament cost \$5.50, and will be sold until August 20.

### Mlle. Lenglen's Playing Surprises English Critics

Wimbledon, June 27.—Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen, the twenty-year old tennis player, who hails from France, is the sensation of the English tennis circles as a result of her two-set victory over Mrs. Larnzombe in the third round of the women's championship here yesterday. Mlle. Lenglen won, 6-2, 6-1.

It was universally agreed among the critics in the gallery that the French girl is the finest woman player seen here since the visit of Miss May Sutton, of California, in 1907. American players are speculating on the probable result of a match between Mlle. Lenglen and Miss Molla Bjurstedt or Mrs. George W. Wightman.

### REOPEN PLAYGROUND

Improved Chestnut Street Recreation Center Will Boost Tennis  
Chestnut Street Recreation Center will open officially July 1, after a lapse of two years' inactivity, having been taken over from the city by the War Department as a storehouse during that time.

A special effort will be made to feature tennis, both indoor and outdoor. The outdoor courts will be enclosed by cages to avoid balls from falling into the river. It is expected that the future indoor tennis championships will be conducted here. It has a cement flooring and is very fast and true. Dancing will also be featured, the City Band furnishing the music.
