

SERG. YORK WILL BE METHODISTS' GUEST

He and Commander Read Will Feature Centenary's Close on Saturday

PASTORS APPROVE MOVIES

Columbus, O., July 8.—With Lieutenant Commander A. C. Read, of the NC-4, and Sergeant Alvin C. York, of Pull Mall, Tenn., as centenary guests Saturday, the Methodist Centenary Exposition is expected to draw to a close with impressive speeches and one of the largest crowds that has yet been recorded on the grounds.

Major General Edwin F. Glenn, who commanded the Eighty-third Division overseas, opened the exercises yesterday, with a talk on "The American Army in France." He advocated a program of state military preparedness, and urged an immediate movement to reduce the percentage of illiteracy in this country.

General Glenn said the startling amount of illiteracy disclosed in the operation of the draft is due to poorly paid teachers and improper functioning of the schools.

Among those given positions of honor at this meeting were 140 wounded soldiers from the Camp Sherman base hospital.

At another big meeting in the afternoon Colonel Robins, who served with the Red Cross in Russia, spoke on bolshevism and conditions in Russia.

World-Wide Reconstruction "I ask that you reserve judgment on Russia," he said. "The real facts are not yet known, but we know that the greatest economic revolution in history is now in progress."

The answer to the Bolshevik desire in better human life, co-operation in church affairs and more competent laws dealing with the unemployed, he continued.

Major Edward du Pont, French high commissioner to the United States and one of the four survivors of a company of 250 that fought at the beginning of the war, emphasized the fact that the French do not want charity, but do want the chance to work again and reconstruct their country.

"Their great and crying need in order

to get the country back into shape is implements," he declared. "Without them they cannot till the soil, which means their daily bread."

Captain E. Cacciponti, of the Italian army, and Richard Santi, head of the Methodist Orphanage in Italy, made brief talks through interpreters in behalf of their countries.

All speakers of the reconstruction program emphasized the fact that reconstruction would be effected by the countries themselves if the United States is willing to extend them a hand.

Motion Pictures Approved

More than 100 Methodist ministers approved the introduction of motion pictures into their churches as a religious, spiritual and educational movement. The ministers attended the conference between a number of prominent motion picture producers and church officials.

Several protests were made by both ministers and laymen. It was said that motion pictures in the churches defeated the purpose for which the Sabbath was created and changed it from a day of rest to a day of pleasure seeking. It was also brought out that Methodists were contradicting themselves in permitting pictures in the churches, especially on Sundays.

Today is Pan-American, Michigan and Detroit Day at the exposition.
