

PERSHING LUNCHEONS WITH KING GEORGE V

General Is Guest in Buckingham Palace—Will Lead Parade Saturday

WATCH GERMANY, HE URGES

By the Associated Press London, July 17.—General Pershing, who is here to lead the American troops in the victory parade Saturday, was the guest of Queen Mary and King George at luncheon in Buckingham Palace today.

Yesterday the American commander was a guest of the American Luncheon Club and later was presented to the king and queen at Buckingham Palace.

General Pershing was loudly cheered when he entered the dining room, and again when presented by Ambassador Davis, who was toastmaster.

He paid high tribute to the British for their part in the war.

"It must have been with a sense of great satisfaction," said General Pershing, "that you Americans living in England learned of America's entry into the war, and with what interest you watched the coming of our expedition."

The first was the naval contingent under Vice Admiral Sims, who quickly recognized that the difficulties demanded an increase of craft for destroying submarines and unity of command.

I give him and the navy thanks for their attitude toward the army, and feel safe in saying that never before was there such complete unity of action between these branches of the service.

"But peace has victories no less than war. Now that the end has come it is for us to look forward to a solution of great questions at home and abroad."

BUGBEE REJECTS PROHIBITION ISSUE

Enforcement Only Thing Left for Jersey to Do, Says Gubernatorial Aspirant

FOR SUFFRAGE REFERENDUM

Trenton, July 17.—Declaring that prohibition is not an issue in the New Jersey gubernatorial campaign and that the national dry amendment will become effective before the next Legislature meets and before the next governor is inaugurated, State Comptroller Newton A. K. Bugbee, of Trenton, one of the candidates for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, at a speech at Madison, N. J., last night declared that

there was nothing left for New Jersey to do except to co-operate in the enforcement of the amendment.

"On woman suffrage," said Mr. Bugbee, "I believe the voters of the state are entitled to the right to express their opinion through the referendum in view of the fact that a very short time ago a referendum vote on this issue resulted in a 50,000 majority against the giving of the right of suffrage to women. It seems to me to be purely a question of square dealing with the voters of the state. I also believe in a referendum vote on all constitutional amendments, because such a process, to my mind, is the fullest exemplification of government by the people as set forth in the constitution of the United States. I can say in all frankness that I believe the right of suffrage will very soon be given to women."

"I strongly favor as broad a measure of home rule for municipalities as can be accomplished under our state constitution because I believe that localities can govern themselves far more satisfactorily than can be done through state legislation."
