Five-Year-Old Girl Found After Being Missing for Three Days

#### CHILD'S MOTHER PROSTRATE

Police and citizens of Highland Park. N. J., today are searching the town and woods in its vicinity for the kidnapper of Ethel McCleave, five years old, who was found sick and exhausted on a rain-soaked meadow, after having been missing since Saturday.

The child was found along the freight entoff of the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad near Riverview Heights.

Discovery of the missing child was made last night by Charles Hess, an employe of the Pusey & Jones shipperd. whose dog ran up the bank barking furiously, inducing his owner to follow him Hess took the child to her home, where she was placed in bed with her mother. who has been ill since her disappear ance. Dr. George Adams, of Glonces-ter, was called to attend the child. Search made by employes of the Puscy

& Jones Company and the authorities for the missing girl proved unavailing.
