To the Senate: I have the honor to transmit to the Senate herewith, accompanied by a letter from the Secretary of State. a brief protocol to the treaty of peace with Germany. The certified copy which I transmit has just been received by the Department of State. and I am transmitting it without de-

The protocol originated in a written interchange of views between the representatives of the allied and associated powers and the representatives of Germany as a result of which the representatives of Germany requested that certain explanations of nethods and facilities which it was proposed should be accorded the Ger-Government in the execution of the treaty should be reduced to writing and signed by the powers signato the treaty so as to form a definite and binding memorandum.

As the cost of occupation involves n equivalent reduction of the ount available for reparations, the allied and associated powers stipu-ated by Article 431 of the treaty that if before the end of the fif teen-year period Germany had fulfilled all her obligations under the reaty, the troops of occupation should be immediately withdrawn.

If Germany, at an earlier date has given proofs of her good will and satisfactory guarantees to assure the fulfillment of her obligations the allied and associated pow ers concerned will be ready to come to an agreement among themselves and for the earlier termination of the period of occupation.

Now and henceforward in order to alleviate the burden of the reparation bill they agree that as soon as the allied and associated powers con cerned are convinced that the conditions of disarmament by Germany are being satisfactorily fulfilled, the annual amount of the sums to be paid by Germany to cover the cost of occupation shall not exceed 240, 000,000 marks gold.


