NITTI PARLA DELLA POLITICA ITALIANA

Importanti Dichiarazioni Fatte Durante una Intervista Concessa a Giornalisti

Roma, 8 agosto.—Il Presidente del Consiglio dei Ministri, On. Nitti, dopo una riunione del gabinetto, ha concesso una intervista ad alcuni giornalisti, nella quale ha fatto le seguenti dichiarazioni:

«Il timore di una rivoluzione per propaganda bolscevica in Italia, è assolutamente infondata. In Italia si sono avuti dei disordini come in altre nazioni. Il problema per l'alto costo dei viveri permane e mentre il Governo è riuscito ad ottenere una diminuzione dei prezzi, tuttavia il problema non può essere risolto con una semplice produzione di grano, ma con una gestione più saggia dei prezzi che non fanno altro che paralizzare la vita industriale, aggravando la situazione economica che ricade in danno dei lavoratori stessi con l'aumentare del costo della vita.

«Coversa resistiva, ma il problema nazionale il filino italiano, ristabilire il nostro rapporto tra industriali e mercantili, tra capitale e lavoro. In una parola—ha detto Nitti—occorre che tutti gli italiani siano uniti e concordati nell'affrontare la rinascita economica della Nazione.

«Circa la politica estera, On. Nitti ha dichiarato che il risultato finora conseguito dall'opera del Ministro Tittoni è stato quello di salvaguardare i diritti e gli interessi dell'Italia cercando di ristabilire con le potenze alleate ed associate migliori rapporti di fiducia e di cordialità.

«On. Nitti ha terminato dicendo di aver fiducia nel senatore e colto intellettuale Dr. Indro Montanelli, che ha una soluzione riguardo le aspirazioni dell'Italia, in modo che possa tale soluzione essere soddisfacente per i gravi problemi economici alla vita nazionale ed economica, che tuttora formano oggetto di discussioni e negoziati.

«Durante l'intervista On. Nitti, rispondendo ad interrogazione dei giornalisti, ha detto che non è del tutto improbabile che egli possa incontrarsi con il Primo Ministro francese Clemenceau a un qualche momento, a Londra, il 15 settembre prossimo.

«Il Generale Marzani, tra le acclamazioni del pubblico, ha detto che il problema riguardante la questione di Fiume ed in generale venire ad un accordo riguardo la sistemazione dell'Adriatico orientale.

SUGAR HEADS HELD FOR PRICE GOUGING

Must Answer in Federal Court for Sales at 14 Cents in Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—George W. Sheehan, president and directing head of the Central Sugar Company, Chicago, and three representatives of the concern's local branch were held for the November term of the United States District Court by Federal Commissioner Edward F. Duffey, following a hearing here yesterday on charges growing out of alleged sugar profiteering.

The four men were charged with conspiring to violate section four of the federal food act, which makes it unlawful to charge unreasonable prices for the necessities of life.

Evidence was introduced at the hearing in the form of telegrams and letters, in which it is alleged President Sheehan dictated to the local branch men that they must sell sugar at the price he suggested, and in which he dictated a sugar formula. Special Federal Agent Edgar E. Sheer testified the letters and telegrams, a number of which were admitted as evidence, were found in the office of the local branch by a United States marshal in his presence.

The president of a local biscuit company said on the stand that his company had purchased 2500 pounds of sugar wholesale from the Pittsburgh branch at the rate of fourteen cents a pound. It was this sale that caused the prosecution of the men.

Local representatives arrested were George P. Leinberger, J. J. Shanfer and George U. Dowd, who, with president Sheehan, gave \$2000 bail each for their appearance at the trial. Sheehan was served with the warrant upon his appearance at the hearing this afternoon.

PLAN U. S. LABOR PARTY Chicago Conference to Discuss Project—Henderson to Make Tour Chicago, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—A conference of labor representatives will be held here August 18 to discuss plans for a national labor party, Frank J. Esner, secretary of the Labor party of Illinois, announced today. Delegates from a number of states are expected to attend.

The meeting also will arrange for a itinerary for Arthur Henderson, British labor leader, who has just returned from his tour of the United States. Mr. Esner said. It is decided to launch a national party. A convention will be called for October.
