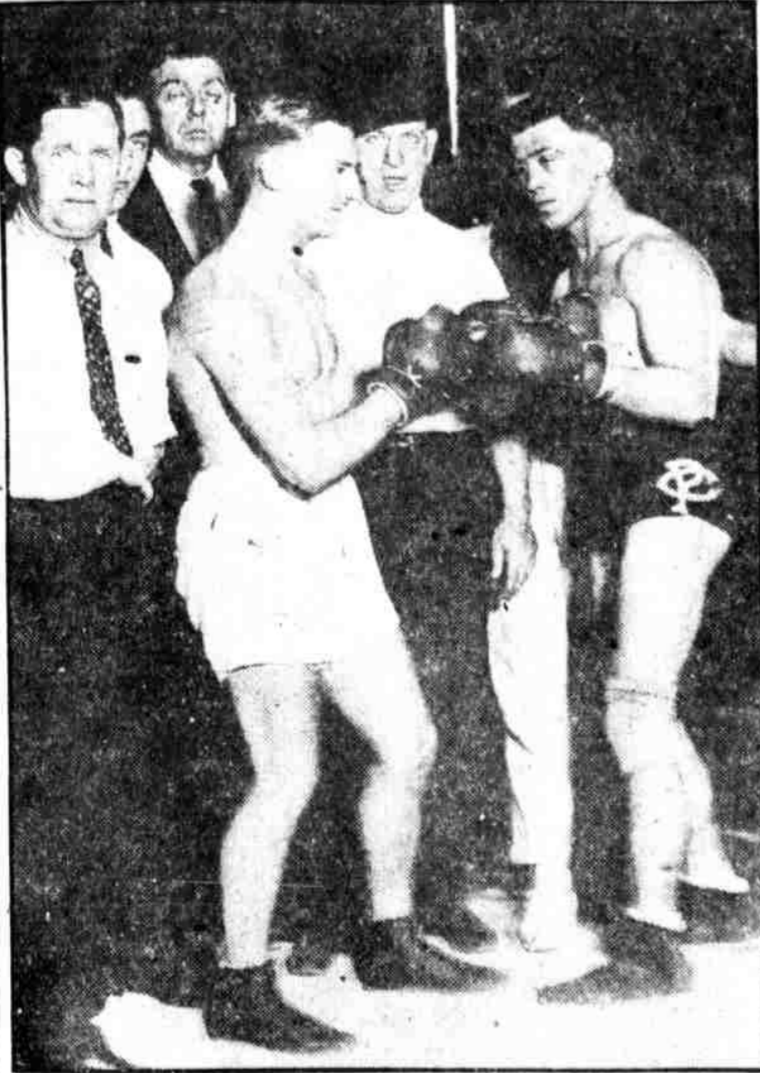

That's the way they work it and it helps them learn to play the game as it should be played.

These boys are sticklers for playing precisely according to Hoyle and they are just as serious in their efforts to play the big game as Eddie Stoeber, George Hoffer and Bill Skyles. They play everything they have in this match and for golfers of such curtailed pen-pendularity, they certainly make a fine showing.

The Woodbury club is to be congratulated upon their caddies tournament and the boys deserve credit for the way in which they conducted it.

BUTCH JONES DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Former Part Owner of Athletics Succumbs at Home Here. Was 67 Years Old

WAS ALWAYS OPTIMISTIC

Samuel H. (Butch) Jones, widely known in sporting circles, especially baseball, died at his home, 2416 North Thirty-third street, at 10 o'clock this morning after a long illness.

Mr. Jones entered the notion business when a youth and in 1877 became connected with the New York Associated Press, later with the United Press, and in 1897 with the Associated Press.

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He resigned as an editor of the Associated Press in 1904 when he became an owner in the Athletics. He held his interest in the club until 1912 when he and Frank L. Hough sold their quarter interest in the team to Connie Mack, giving him a half interest in the club.
