**SENATE COMMITTEE
UPHOLDS PALMER**

Chamber Is Expected to Confirm
His Nomination as At-
torney General

Washington, Aug. 12.—(By A. P.)—Confirmation by the Senate of the nomination of A. Mitchell Palmer to be attorney general was recommended in a unanimous report today by the Senate Judiciary subcommittee which has been holding hearings on the appointment. Chairman Dillingham said the full committee would approve the appointment. Favorable action by the Senate also is expected.

Opposition to Mr. Palmer developed several weeks ago when Senator Frelinghuysen, Republican of New Jersey, presented statements to the subcommittee bearing upon his activities as alien property custodian.

Several witnesses in opposition to Mr. Palmer were heard by the subcommittee and the attorney general personally defended his record.
