Phillies' Ball Park, Aug. 20.—Larry Cheney, after years of faithful service on many big league clubs, made good as a member of the Phils. this afternoon.

He twirled superb ball against the Cubs in the first game while his pals knocked a couple of pitchers loose from their caps. The final count was 10 to 2.

Cy Williams, the elongated farmer, started things in the first when he lifted a homer over the right field wall with Blackburne on base. This ended the scoring until the fourth when, four singles and some swell base running netted three runs.

Abraham Lincoln Bailey, the alien twirler, was game, however, and came back in the fifth for more punishment. He got it. Four hits and three runs made him a candidate for an early shower.

Joel Newkirk, of Morrison, Ill., pitched for the Cubs in the seventh. He had everything but control and a map showing the location of the home plate.

He hit Williams, walked a couple, allowed one hit and two counters counted. One was the result of a double steal engineered by Bancroft and Meusel.

Williams and Luderus did well at the bat. Cy had a homer and two singles, while Ludy had three one-basers. The locals made thirteen hits in the game and also a big hit with the fans.

Cheney got out of a bad hazard in the first when he drove the enemy benchward without a tally. Flack opened with a clean single to center, but was forced at second. Herzog singled to deep short and two were on base.

On a hit and run, Merkle hit to Cheney and was thrown out, but runners roosted on second and third. Larry tightened up and the best Magee could do was to soak one to Paulette. He was thrown out unanimously.

In the third Cheney suddenly became generous. After two were down he passed Hollocher and Herzog. A double steal placed them on second and third, and Merkle tried hard to knock the pill out of the lot, but Larry had other ideas and struck him out.

The Cubs scored their first run in the third. Irish Meusel stepped into a hole in left field and could not reach Barber's skip by which dropped safe for a double. Don's out put the runner on third and Killefer brought him in with a single to deep short.

BROOKES GREATEST OF DOUBLES PLAYERS

Veteran Australian's Wonderful Playing Causes De-thronement of Tilden and Richards as National Doubles Champions; First Foreign Win Since 1903

Boston, Mass., Aug. 20. NORMAN E. BROOKES and Gerald L. Patterson, the Australians, defeated William T. Tilden, 24, of Philadelphia, and Vincent Richards, of New York, the defending champions, in the challenge round of the national doubles championship lawn tennis tournament yesterday afternoon on the championship court of the Longwood Cricket Club at Chestnut Hill.

The match went by five desperately contested sets, by a score of 8-6, 6-3, 4-6, 4-6, 6-2, and not until the final set did it seem that America was to lose the title.

After taking the first two sets, overcoming a long lead in the first set, Brookes and Patterson were outplayed in the third and fourth sets, and Tilden, and particularly the brilliant youngster, Richards, volleyed and smashed with such skill as to fairly dazzle the gallery and take the Australian pair by surprise.

After bringing the match all square, however, the defending champions could not keep to their great pace, and Brookes and Patterson, steadying with superb control, ran out the last set without difficulty, thus taking the doubles title away from this country for the first time since the famous Doherty brothers won the supreme honors in 1903.

Brookes Great Player

Brookes was the bright star of the great match. When he left the court at the end of the first set there were few among the thousands who had watched the struggle from the stands who were not convinced that this veteran of a hundred campaigns is the greatest doubles player in the world today.

Surely, his work yesterday did much to bear out that conviction. Patterson was a tornado in action when he got his racket on a lob, short or deep, and some of his volleying shots at the net were beautifully played, but the young partner of Brookes made many costly errors, and it was then that the cool, methodical, wizardly Brookes proved his worth.

Competing against the great speed of foot and eye of the American stars, the Australian veteran outplayed them both. And all his deeds were done with the finesse that marks the master workman.

The racket that Brookes gripped so easily in his left hand seemed a magic weapon to those who watched the manner in which it blocked an opening here, shot the ball through the defense of the opposing pair there, and seemed always in position to bring off the winning shot.

himself for the crucial test and began to reel off shots that stirred the great gallery of more than 4000 as he had seldom been stirred before.

Tilden Set Fast Pace

Besides taking a hand in every volleying duel at the net, Tilden swept young Richards along with him in their desperate bid for victory until the youthful pair were cleanly outplaying the tall Philadelphia score terrific service ace on Brookes and Patterson the ball traveling at such tremendous speed on several occasions that the Australians did not even attempt to return it.

That is something of an accomplishment against a man of Brookes' own game Tilden. Only Brookes himself outshone Tilden when it came to scoring placement aces with dazzling shots that it did not seem possible to make.

In the final set, both Tilden and Richards weakened, as though the strain of pulling even with their great opponents had been too much of a test. Richards was making more errors than his partner in this set, tossing away many valuable points by lobbing short to the deadly brymasher, Patterson, who "killed" the ball with tremendous whiplike force that sent the ball careening far over the backstop nets.

Tilden did his utmost to encourage the seventeen-year-old boy, and frequently pounced on his partner's territory in his anxiety to score the winning points. That he and Richards were not able to save the doubles championship for America is due not so much to the fact that they faltered toward the last, as that Brookes and Patterson were playing in faultless style as they scented victory.

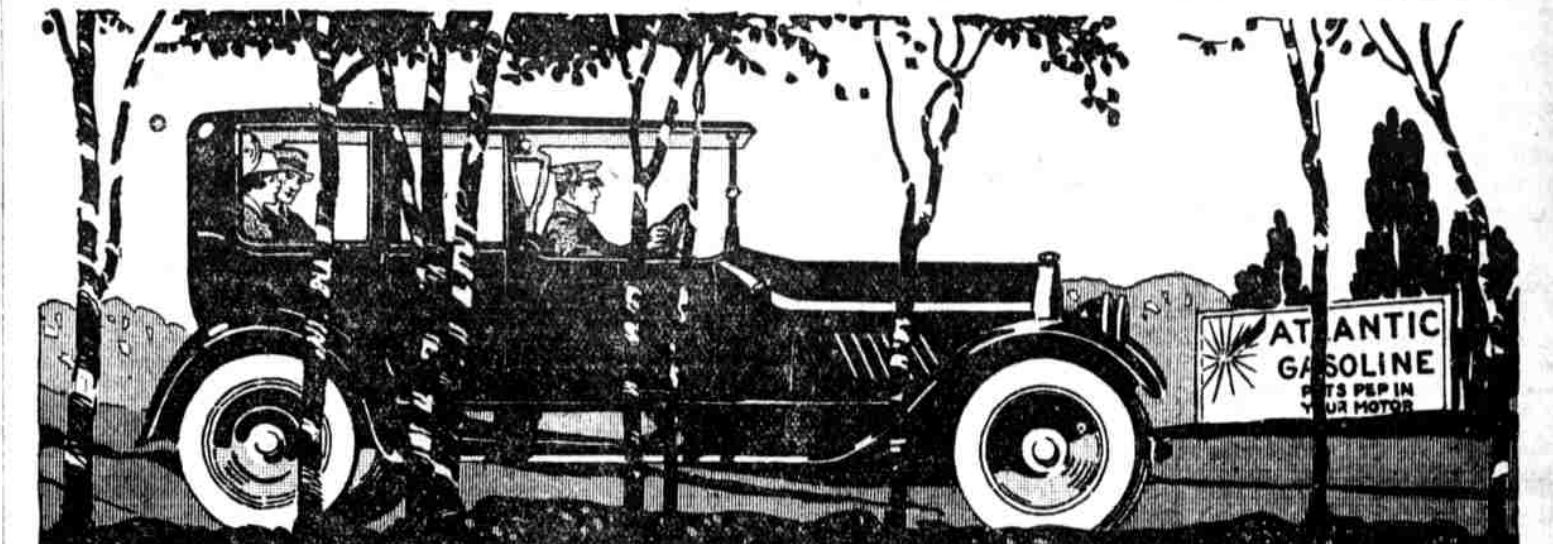
