WILEY TAKES FIRST IN LONG PACE RACE

Slippery Track Causes Officials to Stop Grind in Forty-seventh Mile

CARMAN IS SECOND

THE daredevils, those whirling sons of pace... Through a light mist—a slight drizzle and against a forty-mile breeze, five and a half miles pedaled their way in the International race after the race at the Point Breeze Velodrome last night.

At the time George Wiley, former American champion, was well in front and according to the rules it was his race. At the time Clarence Carman was delivering one of his characteristic thrilling spurts, which chopped down one mile in five.

Carman Shows Speed Carman was clocked in twenty seconds for two laps during this race, and moving at the rate of sixty miles an hour is some speed when pedaling behind a motor.

For thirty miles the race was a thriller. Four of the five menmakers were artists and took all the chances that go to make a real pace race. Madonna was behind Mowin, Wiley and Hunter, Curry followed Stein and Carman trailed Anderson.

Everything was lovely until Madonna was taken ill and forced to leave the track. Chapman immediately caught on behind Mowin and started to fly. With Curry off the track Carman picked up Stein, and from the thirty-five-mile mark until the abbreviated finish it was a battle between Carman, Chapman and Wiley. This was the last part of the race.

Twice the crowd started for the exits when a light drizzle started to fall. Only Drennon leading the army in his coat of arms procession. The rain refused to fall in quantities and the gathering lingered until the end. Five thousand packed the stands last night.

Wiley rode the entire distance without a break. Hunter paced another brilliant race, but he found some worthy competition in Stein and Mowin, both of whom showed the necessary class. Wiley's time for the distance was 1 hour 6 minutes.

Four riders will take part in a thirty-mile race at the Velodrome tomorrow night, with George Chapman, Elmer Collins, Perry Henschel and Mervin Bell doing the riding. A five-mile amateur race also is on the card.

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M'CABE HANDS ROWLANDS BOXING LESSON AT SHORE

Downtown Welterweight Outfights Welterweight Most of Way at Atlantic City—Mealy Beats Phillips in Hard Fight

He pushed his right eye in front of M'cabé's looks and it went in morning, besides being cut. However, Len kept coming and earned an even break in a rattling round of rugged shugging.

At the beginning of the eighth round, M'cabé socked Rowlands with a hard right over the left ear, causing blood to seep from an ugly wound. This punch, suffered by Len inspired Rowlands to his extreme. He continually rushed at Mealy, punching incessantly with both hands and at the finish had M'cabé in fairly bad shape.

Mealy Beats Phillips After giving a two-round skating exhibition, Johnny Mealy finally got enough room under his shoes to enable him to keep his equilibrium, and by coming with the clever punch he succeeded in countering Joe Phillips. Phil got poked every once in a while when Johnny massaged his nose with straight lefts, and the Wop swung a lot of hard punches that didn't count for anything because they didn't land.

Referee Dan Sullivan, who Mealy had to display perfect footwork to keep out of way of Phillips's wild whangs, but, by the way, worked in all of the bouts and he worked well.

Kid Wagner earned Nig Huxey's odds by winning from a tough kid, Jimmy Myson by name. Myson proved a rugged brawler, showed that he could take a lot of punishment and come back for more. He got more, and then some.
