Comment Favorably on Clear and Concise Statement of Actual Conditions—Gossip of the Street

THE cheerful atmosphere of Friday last pervaded the financial district during the half session on Saturday. One of the most frequent topics of discussion was in relation to the report of the previous day about the railroads. This apparently well authenticated report was to the effect that the railroads are to be returned at the end of this year, and that the government guarantee is to be continued for two years more. The favorable comments on this temporary settlement of the railroad question were

referred to in this column on Saturday.

In many brokers' offices on Saturday there was very favorable comment on the statement of Judge Lovett concerning the railroads when he appeared before the House interstate and foreign commerce committee. This was spoken of as a clear, concise statement of actual conditions. It was said by one broker that if the roads are to be turned back and the government guarantee continued for two more years, such a move would meet Judge Lovett's argument that the question before Congress is to find out how to get the capital necessary to keep up railroad facilities for national needs Such an arrangement, it was said, would have a tendency to draw the new capital necessary to the roads, and give sufficient time to find a perma-

nent solution to the railroad muddle.

A banker said that the test of government operation had been unfair, as conditions were abnormal, but with proper government supervision for two years under normal conditions it would be easier to arrive at an un-

Debacle in Exchange Only Halted

At the close of last week the opinion was general that in default of some financial relief measure such as was outlined by H. P. Davison, of J. P.
