

**1 DEAD; 5 INJURED
IN ACCIDENTS HERE**

**Eight-Year-Old Child Instantly
Killed When Motortruck
Strikes Her**

DRIVER PUT UNDER ARREST

One child was killed and five persons injured in various accidents within the last twenty-four hours in and about the city.

Eight-year-old Helen Hynes, 2004 Arch street, was instantly killed when struck by a motortruck on Twenty-first street, near Arch. William Heine, Upland street near Sixty-eighth, driver of the truck was arrested.

Hugo J. Gara, 6709 Ridge avenue, fell from a trolley car while alighting in Roxborough. He is in St. Timothy's Hospital, suffering from concussion of the brain and other injuries.

Eight-year-old Alice Hassett, 700 North Thirty-fourth street, was badly hurt when struck by a motorcar in the street in front of her home. She is in the Presbyterian Hospital. The driver of the car, G. Grellet Collins, 411 Walnut street, was arrested. He will have a hearing today before Magistrate Harris.

Marshall Cenk, sixty-six years old, 1707 Edwin street, is in St. Joseph's Hospital, suffering from concussion of the brain and other hurts received when he was struck by an automobile at Thirtieth and Poplar streets.

Stanley Deckski, 128 Seville street, was seriously burned about the face and arms last night while trying to extinguish a fire in his home, caused by the overturning of a kerosene lamp.

Thomas D. Enoch, one of the oldest residents of Holmesburg, died yesterday of injuries received when he fell from the top of a ladder while engaged in painting his home.

61 P. R. R. MEN RETIRE

Veteran Employees Placed on "Honor Roll;" Get Pensions

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has added sixty-one names to its "roll of honor," which consists of employees who have attained the age of seventy years. They are retired with a pension. Of this number nine had served the railroad more than fifty years, while twenty-three others had a record of between forty and fifty years of service. Twenty-nine only had been with the company less than forty years.

The rule adopted by the road is that all employees must retire and go upon pension when they reach the age of seventy, but many, because of illness, are retired and pensioned by the road when they are between the ages of sixty-five and seventy. The total number of employees on the "roll of honor" now 4083, while the total number those who have been on its roster since the plan was adopted January 1, 1900, totals 8917.

NEW LEGION POST FORMED

**Thirty Discharged Soldiers Organize

Temporary organization of a new post of the American Legion, Post No. 204, was perfected at a meeting of more than thirty discharged soldiers last night in the Baptist Temple, Broad and Berks streets.
