

BISHOP, BORN HERE, VICTIM OF STORM

Paul J. Nussbaum, of Passionist Order, Among Dead at Corpus Christi

LIFE DEVOTED TO THE POOR

Bishop Paul J. Nussbaum, the "bishop with a couch of straw," who was born and received his early education in this city, has been identified as one of the dead found in the storm wreckage at Corpus Christi, Tex.

He died as he lived, in the service of the See over which he had no jurisdiction. Bishop Nussbaum's body was found some distance from his home in a poor section where he had evidently gone to administer aid.

Bishop Nussbaum was born in Philadelphia forty-eight years ago. He was raised a Catholic and when seventeen years old decided to enter a monastery. He chose the active but austere life of the Passionist monks and gained admission to their monastery at Pittsburgh.

In South America As Brother Paul he went to South America as a missionary after five years of study in Pittsburgh. His first real work began in Brazil, then in the throes of a revolution. Against the advice of ship officers he insisted upon landing the first day he reached that country and before nightfall was ministering to the sick and dying.

His next heroic work was at Rosario. He worked there during an epidemic of the bubonic plague. The first night he buried fifteen persons. He cared for motherless children in the chapel and made himself a veritable angel to the inhabitants until the epidemic was checked.

After that work he was admitted to the priesthood and became Father Paul. He continued his missionary work during the yellow fever epidemic in Argentina.

Following that he was summoned to Rome and was attached to the head monastery of the Passionist order there.

Eleven years ago he asked to be returned to the United States and assigned as consultant of the Eastern Province and attached to the monastery of St. Michael's, in Hoboken. He devoted his work to the poor and was little known among the richer church-goers. In 1913, Pope Pius X startled many devout Catholics by the appointment of the Passionist priest to the leadership of the new See at Corpus Christi. How well Bishop Nussbaum fulfilled that trust is best told by the stories of praise heard of him in the See.

During all his wanderings and after being created a bishop, he never forgot his Passionist vows. Even while bishop of Corpus Christi he still slept on a couch of straw and wore the brown cloth garb of his order around his home.
