Schedule of Entertainments at the Various Play-houses in this City

NEW ATTRACTIONS

CHESTNUT STREET OPERA HOUSE—Good Morning, Judge, imported from London, where it ran three seasons, via New York, where it ran last season. A musicalized version of Pinero's farce, "The Magistrate." Cast includes George Hassall and Sher Camp, who have leading roles.

LYRIC—"330 East," comedy, by Rachel Crother, author of "Old Lady 71," "The Three of Us," and "Madame X." Story of a young girl who enters into New York life via a fashionable boarding house. Constance Binney and Henry Hull play the two young lovers.

CONTINENT ATTRACTIONS FORREST—"Scandals of 1919," a new production. George White, the dancer. Musical revue that treats topical questions of the day. George White, Lowell Drew, Ann Brannington, George Eddle, Yvette Rugel are among the entertainers, as well as a sprightly chorus. A dandy "dancing show," with good singing and clean comedy.

ADELPHI—"The Hon. Abe Patash," a comedy by Montague Glass and Jules Eckert Goodman, starring Barney Bernard. The story of a Jewish merchant who is drawn into politics and thereby loses himself in hilarious complications.

WALNUT—"The Logic of Larry," introducing a clever new Irish star, Harry McCormick. An Irish-American comedy by Willard Mack, author of "Tiger Rag" and "The House of Mirth." Industrial troubles furnish the background of the play, which is effectively acted.

BROAD—"Mis Nelly of N'Orleans," by Lawrence Eyre. "Nelly" is a brilliant, delightful and complex person. Mrs. Fiske is at her best in the name part, and has notable support.

GARRICK—"Three Faces East," a mystery melodrama by Fred and Gertrude Servino, by Anthony Paul Kelly. The plot has to do with German spies and British counter-espionage. Violet Heming heads the cast.

BROADWAY—"Sins," featuring Al Johnson. Associated with him are Lawrence D'Orsay, Forrest Huff, Fritz von Busing and other principals and a large and busy chorus. A typical Winter Garden extravaganza.

PHOTOPLAY STANLEY—"The Life Line," with Maurice Tourneur as director. It is the play "Romany Rye," which proved so successful in London and was written by George R. Sims. Many thrills are promised, such as shipwreck, the fire and exciting rescues. Lew Cody, Jack Holt, Pauline Stark, Seena Owen, Tully Marshall and Wallace Berry are in the important roles.

PALACE and GREAT NORTHERN—"The Hoodlum," with Mary Pickford as the star. This play is a combination of many of the best things which the star has done in a comedy line in some of her other films. It was favorably reviewed.

ARCADIA—"Widow by Proxy," with Marguerite Clark in the leading role. It is the film adaptation of the play of the same title, by Catherine Chisholm Cushing. Walter Edwards directed it and Nigel Harrie has been entrusted with the role of the leading man. The first three days will be devoted to the play, which will be followed by a musical comedy.
