

Royal Belgians' Sight-Seeing Raiment : Fair Serbian Here : Visiting Warship : Divers Views



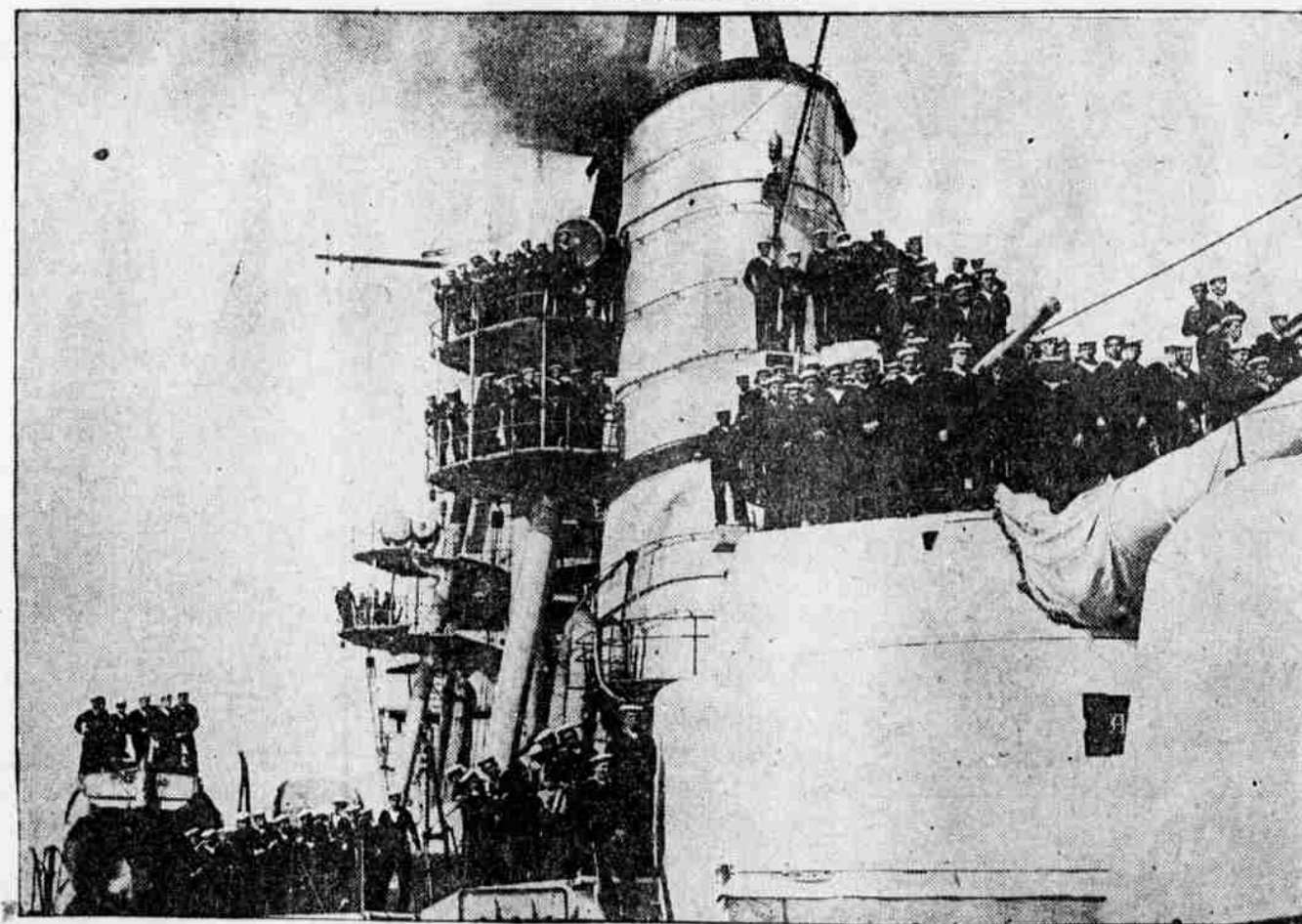
