CROSSING GUARD ON P. & R. ORDERED

Service Board Demands Watchman at Oreland and Annunciator at Roslyn

HEAVY TRAFFIC AT 2 POINTS

The Public Service Commission has ordered the Reading Railway to station watchmen at the Oreland grade crossing, where Miss Elizabeth D. Lockwood, of Chestnut Hill, and Miss Julia

B. Lear, of Germantown, were killed recently when their automobile was struck by a Reading train.

The commission has also ordered the railway to install an annunciator at the Roslyn crossing to aid the watch-nian there in detecting arrival of trains. The commission's order is in the form of an indorsement of the report of John P. Dobeney, chief of the accident bu-renu, which follows:

"Oreland Crossing-The protection at "Oreland Crossing—The protection at this crossing is now supplied by an alarm bell and there should be addi-tional protection by the assignment of a watchman. While normally there is a good view of approaching trains, the highway is crossed by a double track and trains moving in opposite directions are likely to create conditions that are made misleading by the ringing of

"Roslyn Crossing—The assignment to this place of a day and night watchman. This crossing is located on the Northeast Penn branch and silthough the lie is of single-track construction, the character and extent of the highway traffic justify protection during the full twenty-four-hour period. The railroad at this point is crossed by the Germantown and Willow Grove turn-pike and by the Susquehanna road. On September 20, from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m., the traffic consisted of 350 pedestrians, 615 automobiles, forty-five motorcycles, fifty bicycles and seventy-six teams. From 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. the traffic was 175 pedestrians, 245 automobiles, ten motorcycles, forty-five bicycles and ainety teams. Records of the travel taken in September 30 and on October 1 substantially are in keeping with these Roslyn Crossing-The assignment to substantially are in keeping with these figures. In connection with the proposed protection, I suggest that an annunciator be provided to notify the watchman of approaching trains."

way, With Short-Run Section New schedules will be inaugurated by the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company on the elevated-subway sys-tem on Sunday, November 2. Head-way between traips will be cut down and every other train will be turned at Sixty-third street at the western

at Sixty-third street at the western end and at Second street at the eastern end of the system.

Trains at these points will be shifted from one track to another and sent back over the portion of the line between Sixty-third and Second streets, which has the largest traffic. There is also to be an increase in train service. Trains during the nonrush periods will be operated every three minutes instead of every four minutes, as now. During the rush hours headway between trains will be only one and three-quarters instead of two minutes.




