Large Crowd Welcomes Artist After First "Big Noise" of Season in Adelphia Hotel Tonight Fritz Kreisler demonstrated on Sat The "first big noise" of the fall is orday afterneon what a hold he has on the music lovers of Philadelphia, when he made his first appearance here since he withdrew from the concert stage of the Adelphia Hotel.

he withdrew from the concert stage more than two years ago. Every sent in the Academy from pit to ampitheatre was occupied. About 150 persons were accommodated in the orchestra pit and double that number sat on the stage.

Mr. Kreisler's playing justified the attendance. He has lost none of his skill through his voluntary retirement, while in depth of sentiment and that real artistry that makes technique its servant, he seems actually to have gained.
