ARRANGE FUNERAL OF REUBEN O. MOON Former Congressman, Who Died Suddenly on Saturday, to Be Buried Wednesday

The funeral of Reuben O. Moon, former congressman, who died suddenly in the Columbia Club Saturday night, will be held Wednesday. The arrangements have not been completed.

Mr. Moon was seventy-two years old and apparently in good health. He had been in the club only a few minutes when he suffered a stroke of apoplexy.

He was formerly president of the club. Mr. Moon was at one time chairman of the congressional committee that completed the great task of revising the laws of the United States.

His last great work in Congress was helping to draft the copyright law which is now in effect. He was a member of the faculty of the National School of Oratory here.

During his later life Mr. Moon took a prominent part in politics and was elected to Congress in 1908 from the Fourth district. His work there was of a most important character.

The committee which revised the laws of the United States spent years quietly working. The code turned out by the committee consisted of 11,000 sections.

In 1905 Congressman Moon served as one of the American delegates to the Interparliamentary Union for International Arbitration, which met in Brussels. He was three months abroad and spent considerable time in travel, being urged to attend by Pope Pius X.

Mr. Moon also belonged to the Lawyers Club, the Union League, the Penn Club and the Historical Society of Pennsylvania.

In 1870 he married Miss Mary A. Pedmore, of Barnegat, N. J. They had two children: Harold P. Moon, a lawyer, who died about a year ago, and Mrs. C. A. Musselman, wife of C. A. Musselman, treasurer of the Children's Printing Company.

DAYLIGHT "USING" CAUSES CONFUSION Ferry Passengers Reaching City Find Themselves Apparently an Hour Behind Time

Thousands of New Jersey commuters got a jolt this morning when, on arriving at Market street after a slow trip on the street clock corroborated, they found themselves an hour behind time.

The journey across the river required an unusual length of time by reason of the heavy fog, but few could believe that an entire hour had been lost in transit. The 8 o'clock crowd hastening on Market street glommed at the sound of street clocks in front of a store near Third street, saw the time recorded as 8:45 and suffered visions of call-downs by employers.

It was reassured as to the correctness of the time on the New Jersey side of the river a number stopped in a corner cigar store, only to find the time of the street clock corroborated. City Hall clock was observed in the early morning fog, and it was not until many reached their places of employment that they received assurance that they were an hour behind time.
